Tips for *Rugby* Players.

Here are some tips for aspiring football players, and some of the vets, could probably read them over, too: A drop kick is usually made by dropping the ball with a slight tilt backwards. When it touches the ground, the toe hits the ball on the underside.

The ball should be dropped on a level spot; keep your eye on the ball after gauging the distance and direction of the goal posts.

In open field tackling, don't run up to the man with the ball. It gives him a chance to dodge. Wait for him. Point from left to right. Pounce him. Then tackle him low.

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LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

The Prices Paid at the Various Centres.

Montreal, Sept. 25.—About 110 head of butchers' cattle, 150 calves, 1,400 sheep and lambs and 1,450 hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stockyards this forenoon.

The offerings of live stock at this market during the week note 1,650 cattle, 290 calves, 2,600 sheep and lambs, and 2,800 hogs. The wet muddy weather was unfavorable to trade, but there was not much change in the prices, cattle being rather easier.

Prime heifers sold at 50c. to 60c. per lb.; pretty good animals, 4½c. to 5½c. and the common stock 2½c. to 4½c. per lb. Calves sold at from 3c. to 7½c. per lb.

Sheep sold at 3½c. to 4c. per lb.; lambs at 5½c. to 6½c. per lb. Hogs sold at from 6c. to 7½c. per lb.

Toronto Cattle Prices.

Toronto, Sept. 25.—The market was generally firmer to-day and prices were steady. Butcher cattle were in good demand and were selling well. Hogs were selling rather low. W. Dunn sold 10 lambs at \$5.40, 25 sheep at \$3.85, and 25 calves at \$7.50. C. Zeagman sold two loads of mixed cattle weighing from 900 to 1,000 pounds at from \$3.25 to \$3.50.

Receipts were 2,486 cattle, 46 calves, 210 hogs and 480 sheep.
