THE NAME SELECTED FOR KINGSTON'S NEW SCHOOL.

Corner Stone Will be Laid on Thursday Afternoon by Chairman of Board, W. J. Renton—Y.W.C.A. to Have Use of Collegiate Gymnasium—Other Business Before the Board.

The new public school, which is now in the course of construction, in Kingston, will be known as the Macdonald school, named after the great statesman, Sir John A. Macdonald.

This name for the new school was decided upon at the meeting of the board of education held on Monday night. The corner stone of the school will be laid on Thursday afternoon, at 4:30 o'clock, by the chairman of the board, W. J. Renton.

In addition to the chairman there were present at the meeting Trustees Anglin, Craig, Donaldson, Lockett, Farrell, Henderson, Lambert, Elliott, Lyons, Macne, Metcalfe, McLean, Walkem and Wallace.

Miss Elizabeth McCallum, secretary of the Young Women's Association, wrote the board asking for the use of the gymnasium at the Collegiate Institute for the young women members of the association for two evenings a week and on Saturday, to commence in October, the association to pay for the instruction and care of the gymnasium.

A number of the ladies working in the interest of the association waited on the board on behalf of the petition and Rev. Dr. Ross and Frederick Welch spoke for them.

Dr. Ross, before asking for the use of the gymnasium, took occasion to refer to the fact that the Young Women's Christian Association had been in existence for thirty years, and paid a warm tribute to the work the association was carrying on. The association, he said, was doing good work in a quiet way. By Ross' remarks many public buildings, in his estimation, were closed up. Too much of the time, and in this way they were not being used for all the good that they could be used for. He believed that there were public buildings which could be used to greater advantage. He pointed out the great credit it would be to the members of the association to have the use of the gymnasium and to have the board to give the matter serious consideration.

Frederick Welch also referred to the good work of the association. Young women were being helped in various ways and he looked upon the association as an auxiliary to the educational system. Kingston, he pointed out, was growing, and he believed the board would be doing a good thing in allowing the association the use of the gymnasium for the work. The physical side of life had to be looked after.

Mr. Welch also advocates the opening of night schools in the city, stating that some of the world's brightest men had received the most of their education in night schools.

After the deputation had retired the matter was dealt with, and on motion of Trustee Elliott, seconded by Trustee Lambert, the petition of the association was granted, and the management committee was given the power to make the necessary arrangements.

In moving the resolution Trustee Elliott took occasion to refer to the grand work the association is carrying on in the city, and stated that he was heartily in sympathy with the request of the ladies. He agreed with Rev. Dr. Ross when the latter stated that there were many public buildings which were not being utilized to their capacity. They could be put to more use for the uplifting of some of the older people, as well as the young.

A good deal more could be accomplished to make Kingston a more progressive, educational centre. Trustees Macne, Walkem, Henderson, Lockett, Farrell and Lambert also paid tribute to the work of the association. Trustee Lockett said the association was doing a broad work and the least the board could do would be to give the association the use of the gymnasium.

Trustee Farrell agreed that the gymnasium could not be put to better use. Trustee Elliott went so far as to suggest that a series of lectures be given in some of the schools on appropriate subjects, and although no action was taken it was regarded with favor.

The motion of Trustee Elliott, to grant the request of the Young Women's Christian Association, was carried by a unanimous vote.

Communications Received.

The secretary notified the board of having received a cheque for \$50 from the provincial treasurer, a grant for teachers' certificates.

The resignation of Miss Maude Cannon from the teaching staff was received by the members with regret, and accepted. Miss Cannon has been on the staff for twelve years.

S. Harold Miller asked that the board have the dividing fence on the new school property, erected as soon as possible, as was necessary in order to save the property from being destroyed. Referred to committee.

The Hamilton Board of Education, asked for co-operation in a petition, which will be presented to the government, asking that a change be made in the time of holding examinations in the schools, so that they will not be held in the warm time of the year. Referred to committee.

The Ontario Teachers' Alliance wrote urging that there be a form of contract for all teachers taken on the staff, regarding salary, etc., so as the teacher might have knowledge of the prospects, when taking a position.

B. W. Robertson forwarded the board a cheque for \$50 to be used in the writing examinations, which was received with thanks.

Henry Fontaine asked to be allowed the use of one of the rooms, at the Collegiate Institute, after the regular hours, for the purpose of holding a school night, for the purpose of raising funds. He appeared before the board in support of his request, and on motion of Trustee Farrell and Wallace, he was granted the privilege.

Reports of Committees.

The reports of committees were presented as follows:

The report of the management committee read as follows: That Miss Annie Boyd, of Kingston, be appointed to one of the vacancies on the public school teaching staff, under the rules and regulations of the board.

That Miss Annie Fettes, of Bromore, be appointed temporary teacher during the school term at the rate of \$200 per year. That the tender of the G. M. Hendry Co., for kindergarten material for 1911-12 be accepted. The figures are \$93.

That the motion adopted by the board on March 9th, excluding non-resident pupils from the Collegiate Institute, be reconsidered.

Applications were received from forty-two non-residents for admission to the classes of the Collegiate Institute as follows: Five for Form I; eleven for Form II; fifteen for Form III; ten for Form IV; and one for the commercial form. Principal Sitter having reported that there is room at present for these applicants, your committee recommends that they be admitted, their parents to sign an agreement to the effect that in the event of resident pupils requiring all the accommodation of the school, their children from school on receiving a letter from the principal to do so.

That all future applications by non-residents for admission to the Collegiate Institute be dealt with on their merits.

That the non-resident fee for Collegiate Institute pupils be: \$30 per year for Form I, II, Commercial and technical, and \$35 for Forms III, IV and V. The present figures are \$25 and \$30.

The report of the property committee read as follows: That Charles Lazelle be appointed caretaker of Sydenham school building at a yearly salary of \$175.

That no action be taken on the request of Thos. Hafner, caretaker of Frontenac school, for an increase of salary.

That your committee be authorized to name a date and make arrangements for the laying of the corner stone of the new public school building by the chairman of the board, and that a suitably engraved trophy be purchased for use on the occasion, as already stated Thursday afternoon, was selected for the event.

Other Business.

In connection with the admittance of county pupils, to the collegiate it was reported by Principal Sitter, that forty-two had applied and thirty-eight had been received.

The report of the finance committee, recommended the payment of accounts, and was passed, on motion of Trustee Craig, the chairman, seconded by Trustee Walkem.

The report of Inspector Stuart, covering the month of June, was received. It showed the number on the roll to be 2,100, an increase of forty-five over last year. The inspector reported that \$15 had been received from the Kingston Horticultural Society, for writing contests.

Principal Sitter reported an attendance of 365 at the collegiate, including thirty-eight non-residents. He asked that the assembly room, at the collegiate, be provided with seats, to be used for meetings of the Literary society. He requested the Literary society, as one of the most important branches in school work, the society at the present time, had no place to hold meetings. The board will consider the request.

IN MARINE CIRCLES

KEEL OF THE NEW BOAT WAS FORMALLY LAID

At the Kingston Dry Dock on Monday—The Boat When Finished Will be a Model of Neatness—Cabins Will be Finished With Teakwood.

The keel was formally laid of the first of the two government boats, which the Kingston dry dock has the contract for building, on Monday afternoon. Things have been in preparation for a considerable length of time and only yesterday did the construction work begin. It has had to be moulded and holes bored to permit bolting. It also took a long time for the material to get here. A lot of the steel framework came from Scotland while the teak logs, which will fit the interior of the cabins, came from India. The logs came in their natural state and will be cut into lumber here. There is a great deal of waste attached to the cutting of these logs as most of them have large seams running through them.

Things will be very busy at the dry dock for the next few months. Extra men have been taken on at the present time and when the other boat is started and the work advances a larger force will be needed. The work is being done with great accuracy and precision all the matter entering into the construction of the boats being carefully weighed to insure perfect balance. When finished the boats will be models of neatness and skilled labor and a credit to the Kingston Shipbuilding company, such as the other government boat "Polana" which was turned out last fall.

Movements of Vessels.

The schooner Morengo cleared for Erie to-day.

The steamer Caspian is still in the Kingston dry dock and is undergoing an extensive overhauling.

The steamer Buena Vista arrived from Smith's Falls, last night, and will clear on Wednesday morning, for Rideau Ferry.

At Swift's wharf, Steamer Toronto made the river trip to-day; steamer North King was over to-day from Charlotte; steamer Aletha was down from bay ports to-day.

The steamer Alexandria was at Folger's wharf, last night, on her way to Montreal. The steamship Water Lily also passed down, last night, on her way to Montreal.

M.T.C.'s elevator. The steamer Canadian from Fort William lightened her cargo of wheat, and cleared for Montreal; the steamer Turret Court discharged 70,000 bushels of wheat and cleared for Oswego; to load coal for Port Arthur, the tug Haul arrived from Montreal, with two light barges; the tug Thomson cleared for Montreal, with two grain barges.

AT THE POLICE COURT.

Young Man Used Strong Language on Election Night.

He is quite violent at times, and a close watch had to be kept on him. He was handcuffed for the trip, the men leaving on the noon train.

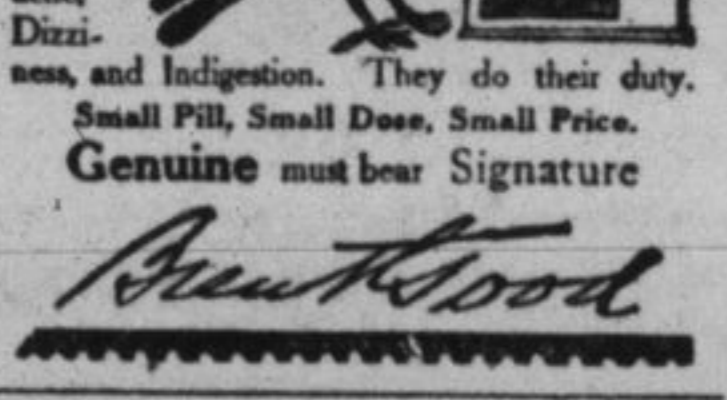
