SENT TO THE CENTRAL

FOR STEALING RIDE ON GRAND TRUNK FREIGHT.

George Bennett Pleaded Guilty to Charge, and Was Given a Term of Six Months — Trainmen Have Great Deal of Trouble—Nuisance Will be Stopped.

For attempting to steal a ride on a Grand Trunk freight train, George Bennett, aged nineteen, was on Wednesday morning, sentenced by Magistrate Farrel, to six months in the Central prison. He pleaded guilty.

Bennett was arrested a few days ago, and remanded. He claimed that he lived at 69 Queen street, Toronto, but the magistrate read a letter from the Toronto police department, in which it was stated that Bennett was not known at this address. The court asked Bennett at this time, but he had no answer to give, showing that he had endeavored to give the police a "fake" address. However, his little game did not work.

The Grand Trunk railway is having, and has been having, for some time, a great deal of trouble with young men and boys, jumping on the trains, in this district, and they are out with a big stick to catch all the guilty parties. When the guilty parties are caught, the court will do the rest.

An example has been made of Bennett's case, and all who have been in the habit of "sorking the train" as they term it, should take warning. Trainmen have had their own troubles in endeavoring to keep the offenders off the train. They claim that when they put the youths off, they pelt stones at the train, and in addition to breaking lamps, do other damage.

Two drunks were in the line-up. One was fined \$1 and costs, for ten days, and the other was given a chance.

ENTER STATES FREE

WOOD PULP AND PRINT PAPER ARRANGEMENT

With New Brunswick Until August, 1912—That Province Will be Exempt From the U.S. Tariff.

Washington, Sept. 27.—Practically all the wood pulp and print paper produced in New Brunswick until August 1st, 1912, will enter the United States free of duty. This is made possible by a revised rule made yesterday by the acting secretary of the treasury, Mr. Curtis, under the only operative clause of the Canadian reciprocity agreement.

The surveyor-general of customs of New Brunswick advised the treasury department that the new law of that province restricting the exportation of wood pulp and print paper will not apply to lands operated under license issued or renewed prior to October 1st, on which date the act becomes effective. The lands are used under long-term laws, governed by yearly licenses, and August 1st is the date for renewing these licenses. Consequently until that time there will be no American import tax on pulp wood or print paper originating from those lands.

THE FAIR WAS SPOILED

RAIN FOR OPENING THE KINGSTON TOWNSHIP EXHIBITION.

Sports for First Day Were Called Off—Exhibits Were Small—Palace in Bad Condition.

Rain coming from every quarter of the sky was the first thing on the programme of the township of Kingston fair, which was opened at the city fair grounds Wednesday afternoon. It was considered very tough luck by directors of the fair. It will be remembered that two years ago it rained twice as hard as at any time Wednesday, and the people were almost swamped at the old palace, which afforded slight protection, as it was as full of holes as a beehive. It was a little better this year, for a great many of the leaks had been patched up, but the palace is still in a very dilapidated condition, not being used by the city for years.

The rain drove through the building in a great many places and as a result the exhibits were rather small for the first day.

A number of the exhibiting places in the building were occupied by some of the leading merchants of the town, among them being Howard W. Marshall, George Mills & Co., A. Chown & Co., D. J. Hay.

Many of the exhibits had not been placed in the building Wednesday, on account of the rain, such as fancy work and other fine arts.

An attractive programme of sports and races had been arranged for, including three horse races (a township race, a named race and a green trot), besides a basketball game between Glensvale and Harrowsmith. All these had to be cancelled, but if the grounds are in condition, they may take place Thursday afternoon.
