

Mrs. Reid was very fortunate in not having received burns, but the fire was put out before it reached her body, although her clothes were badly burned.

FRONTENAC TEACHERS.
Addressed by Dr. A. W. Richardson on "Educational Ideals."

The Frontenac Teachers' Association met on Wednesday evening at Queen's on Thursday morning. This meeting of the teachers will last until Friday afternoon. At ten o'clock, the opening exercises took place. A report of the Ontario Educational Association was given by Mrs. Revelle, of Hartington.

Dr. A. W. Richardson spoke on "Educational Ideals." He pointed out the necessity of all having ideals even though neither the ideal teacher nor pupil teaches. The teacher's duty was to teach the ideal as near as possible, and his reward would be the consciousness of having done his best to attain that end. He emphasized the responsibility placed upon the teacher in having to give direction to the first steps in a child's life. He was to be encouraged in realizing the honor this responsibility carried with it, viz., of having an important share in moulding the future citizenship of our country.

TWO BURGLARS CAUGHT
And Brought From Sharbot Lake to Jail Here.

William J. Hughes and his brother, Frederick Hughes, were brought in from Sharbot Lake on Thursday morning and taken to the jail to await trial.
