

Joseph Chamberlain, or whoever

 old country imperialists, doing any-
 thing for each other, it is the best
 thing they want to do, either side,
 though they may be willing to yield
 the protection pill with a little pre-
 ference. Austin Chamberlain has cer-
 tainly good reason to take courage
 when he sees to himself, doing as he
 can, the empty patriotic cry can be put.
