A SAILOR IMPRISONED

IN THE TURRET OF THE BATTLESHIP LIBERTE.

He is Surrounded by Corpses—Frenzied Efforts Being Made to Release Him.

Toulon, France, Sept. 25.—A living man is imprisoned in one of the turrets of the battleship Liberte, which was sent to the bottom by Monday's explosion, according to salvage men who are working on the wreckage. These men declare that they have been in communication with the imprisoned sailor and that in a feeble voice he told them that he is surrounded in the turret by fifteen corpses. They say that they have succeeded in getting food to him and believe that he can be rescued alive. On receipt of this intelligence frenzied efforts were immediately begun by the authorities to get the man out of the battered steel tube in which he is a prisoner. Eight wounded sailors who had been killed by wreckage in that portion of the battleship remaining above the water, were taken out alive by rescuers early today. Half of them were irretrievably slain and from the twenty-four hours' exposure and it is feared they have been crazed by the horrors through which they have passed. Fifty dead bodies were recovered yesterday.

BIG JEWELLERY DEAL.

Birks Company Buys Rosenthal Building, Ottawa.

One of the biggest property deals that ever occurred in this city, and which will interest jewelers from the Atlantic to the Pacific has occurred here. It is announced that the firm of Birks & Sons, jewelers, with stores at Montreal and Ottawa, have bought out the eight-story Rosenthal building and entire business here. It is said the consideration is \$450,000. This will mean the amalgamating of the two biggest jewellery firms in Ottawa.

By Italy to Turkey to Reply to its Demands.

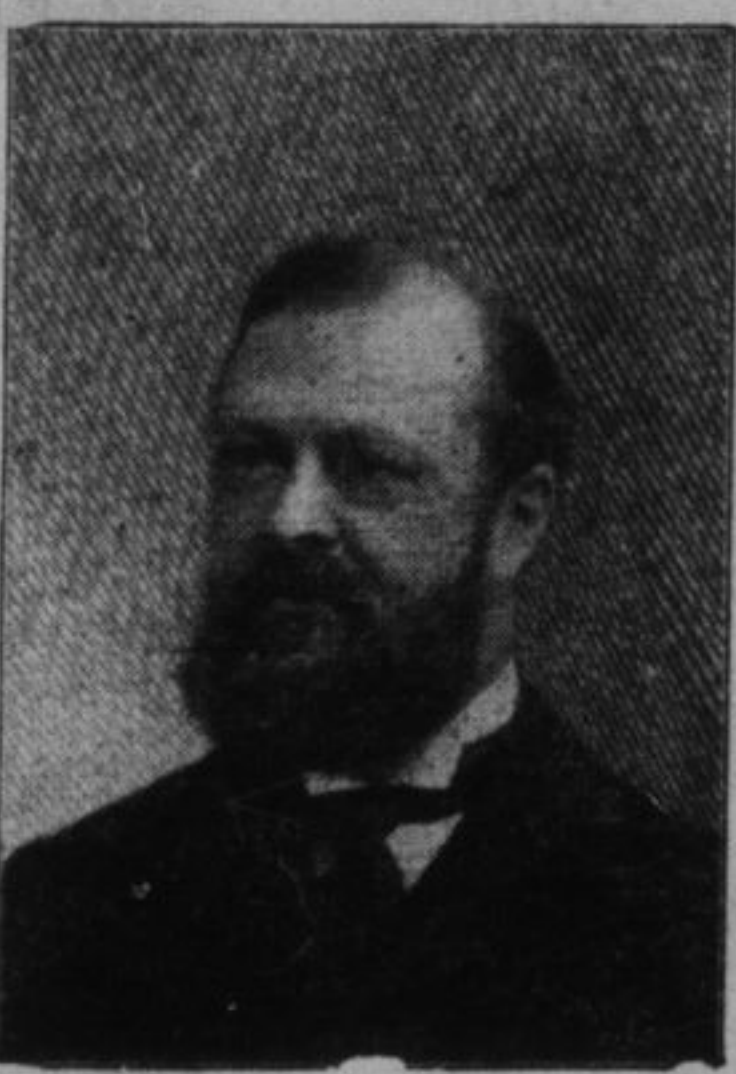

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everybody Easily Read and Remembered.

Saskatchewan provincial elections will be held on November 8th. William McLeister was run over by a freight car at Sarnia and killed. The railways are applying for increased remuneration for carrying the mails.

The banquet to be tendered to the delegates to the ecumenical conference at Toronto will cost \$2,500. The cruisers Leon Gambetta and Ernest Kennan have been ordered to Tripoli to protect French interests.

The sale of the New York & Cornwall cotton mills to Canadian Cottons, limited, has been declared off. The Methodist board of missions is aiming to raise a million and a half dollars for maintenance and extension.

Because of the hostility of the English authorities the Johnson-Wells negotiations and arrangements are all called off.

Snow fell near Le Puy, in the department of Haute Loire, France, on Wednesday. Intense cold prevails in all that region.

An Ottawa mob attempted to rescue a woman from the police, followed them to the station and broke the windows with stones.

It is reported from Ottawa that Earl Grey has postponed his departure from Canada until October 15th to arrange for the change of government.
