IN MARINE CIRCLES

WORK STOPPED TEMPORARILY ON GOVERNMENT BOAT.

Coal Schooners Are Busy Getting in the Winter's Supply—Notes of Interest Gathered Around the Harbor.

Work on the construction of the first government boat at the Kingston dry dock has been temporarily abandoned for some time. The keel was laid Monday and nothing has been done since Tuesday. The men have been put to work inside on the moulding.

At Swift's wharf: Steamer City of Ottawa stopped, last night, on her way down the river, and discharged a considerable amount of freight and a few passengers; steamer Rideau King is due from Ottawa this evening; steamer Aletha was down from bay ports to-day; schooner Bertie Calkins cleared for Oswego, after discharging a cargo of coal at Swift's; steamer Belleville is due to come up the river this afternoon, and the steamer Dandern is due to pass down Sunday morning.

The schooner Britton, held up by bad weather, cleared to-day, for Oswego.

The steamer Alexandria called at Folger's wharf, Friday night, on her way up from Montreal.

The steamer Rosalia passed up Saturday, on her way from Montreal up the lakes.
