BILL FOR MAKING UNIVERSITY UNDENOMINATIONAL.
To be Passed by the New Parliament—Students Not Registering as Last Year—Dunlop Scholarship.

The bill to make Queen's University undenominational will be brought in at the coming session of the new House of Commons. Owing to the debate on reciprocity, the university bill could not be put through at the last session, and it will devolve upon the Borden government to pass the necessary legislation. This session, Queen's will be under Presbyterian control as usual, as there will be no material changes in the conduct of affairs before next year.

The students are not registering at Queen's as rapidly as they did a year ago, so Registrar G. Y. Chown reports. A great many have not yet returned to college. There are fully 300 Queen's students teaching in schools in the far Canadian west, and many of these cannot return before October 1st. It will be impossible for another month to tell whether there will be an increased attendance over last year. Of course, an increase is naturally expected, for there has never been a year that Queen's student body did not show an increase in numbers.

So far the sum of \$2,000 has been promised by Queen's graduates for a Dean Dunlop scholarship. The committee in charge has been so impressed with the number and insistence of suggestions of a larger scheme, that it has decided to put the matter before the graduates and friends with the idea that an effort should be made to reach from \$10,000 to \$15,000. A complimentary dinner to Dean Dunlop is to be held on October 17th.
