NEW FORCE IN KINGSTON.

The young men of the city—those who have been accustomed to consort at the Y.M.C.A., whose associations are clean and inviting—have formed a progressive club. It is not to be confounded with some other progressive clubs, whose objects are more or less dissipating.

The club in question will meet regularly. It will receive suggestions from time to time and discuss anything which means the advancement and prosperity of the community.

What can young men do? some one may ask. They can think seriously on civic matters. They can look for light

on public issues, and debate them upon their merits. They can decide where they should stand as men, non-politically and intelligently, on passing events. They can form opinions and reach judgments. They can be a potent force in the interest of the higher citizenship that should prevail.

Recently a contemporary talked of the persons who went it blind, who know little of the duties of the hour, who showed no aptitude for the responsibilities that rest upon them. The progressive club, if true to its aim, will be one of the greatest agencies for good that the city can have.

The majority must be disappointed with the result when they come to learn of the circumstances, for Kingston cannot afford the salary which can attract high-class men from larger cities and duties more onerous than anything they can find here.

Turkey's parliament has been summoned for next week. In the meantime the cabinet of the new premier, Said Pasha, has again been rent asunder by internal disputes.

Will there be a referendum on the navy question? It is an unbrisk proceeding, and what Britain cannot stand Canada, just now, could not approve. The referendum is a Yankee idea, and the new government cannot stand for it.

The Belleville Ontario does not like the spoils system, but it wants G. Gus Porter, M.P. and a supporter of Borden's to give some evidence of his pull for public works. The Ontario should not tempt Mr. Porter to do wrong. It seems to be falling from grace.
