
COLLARS OF UNICUT VELVET MAKE THE NEW SUITS YOUTHFUL.

THE SPORT REVIEW FAIR HELD AT STELLA

TORONTO ARGONAUTS DEFEATED QUEEN'S BY 15 TO 1. WAS A GREAT SUCCESS IN EVERY WAY.

In an Exhibition Rugby Game on Saturday—The Toronto Team Was in Much Better Condition Than the Local Collegians.

Queen's rugby team walked off the University athletic field, Saturday afternoon, beaten by the Argonauts, of Toronto, to the tune of 15 to 1, in an exhibition game. The collegians think they did well to hold the Torontonians down as well as they did, considering the heavy practising that Argonauts have gone through the last three weeks. The wearers of the tri-color after only a few days' practice, were raw in a number of places, but in the last half of the game did considerably better than in the first, and this was taken as a good sign that they were coming to their own. Queen's has an excellent material any where as Argonauts, but constant and heavy drilling on the part of the visitors was apparent all the way through the game. Sure catching by Argos and fumbling on Queen's part marked the progress of the match all the way through.

Argonauts were strengthened by two former Kingstons, "Ken" Williams, one of the best punters in Canada, who played on the back division of Queen's for four years, was full back for the blue and white, and Arnoldi, the mainstay of the Royal Military College team last season, was one of the Toronto outside wings. Williams' work was mighty helpful to Argos from start to finish, while Binkley, centre half for the visiting team, figured in nearly all the scoring.

The game was watched by fully six hundred people, and considering the short time Queen's athletic committee had at its disposal to advertise the game, it did remarkably well to get that many there. The afternoon was fine and the grounds in good condition. Queen's won the kick-off and rushed the ball to Argos' forty-five yard line. Binkley captured the ball, fumbled and punt to Erskine, who was hurt on a hard tackle. The game was delayed for a few minutes when Binkley punted and forced a rouge. He repeated the performance a minute later, scoring the second rouge. He also figured in the next score, when Pound was forced to rouge. The last score just before the end of the first quarter was made by Lockhart, who forced Hazlett to rouge. The score at the end of the first quarter was 5 to 0 in favor of Argos.

Queen's rallied in the second quarter and held the wearers of the blue and white down to the one rouge, which was made just before the whistle sounded for half time.

In the third quarter, Argos started off with a rush and by the end of it had scored four rouges, most of them made on Williams' magnificent punting. Numerous delays were caused by players becoming hurt and when the whistle sounded, Argos had raised the score to 10 to 0.

In the last quarter Queen's scored its only rouge, and Argos retaliated by scoring a touch, when O'Connor, one of the outside wings, broke through the line. Williams failed to convert and after a few minutes' play, the game was finished.

The game was arranged with the idea of giving each team a workout before the season opens next Saturday. Queen's will be placed in much better condition by this advance game, and Coach Britton will have the squad in fine shape in another week. This will not be the team which will line up against Varsity next Saturday, as some of the men were being tried out, but may not become fixtures.
