The Turks and Press Are Corked.

FEW NEWS MESSAGES

FILTERED THROUGH THE LINES SINCE SATURDAY.

It is said that Tripoli is already occupied by the Italians, and that vessels have been sunk and many lives sacrificed—Appeal Made to the Powers.

London, Eng., Oct. 2.—Not only has Italy got the Turks bottled up, but Tripoli and Turkey, but her system of blockading, cable cutting and censorship has been so complete that scarcely a line of news has filtered through from the seat of war since Saturday night.

There have been lots of rumors and unreliable news despatches, subsequently contradicted, but all very conflicting. Tripoli may or may not be already occupied by the Italians, but it is certain that several small warships and, possibly, larger cruisers and transports with a thousand sailors aboard, have been captured or sunk by the Italian fleet during the last twenty-six hours.

All news out of Constantinople, recently, was a further appeal of the Turkish cabinet for protection of her country and the assurance of German emperor that he would do what he could, but could not do much without backing of other powers. This was received by Sait Pasha from the Laiser this morning.

It is the general opinion here, that Turkey wants peace, almost at any price. It would not surprise people if the war was all over in a few days, but it is agreed here that Italy will have and will hold Tripoli at the finish.

THREE FINE SERVICES

IN PRINCESS STREET METHODIST CHURCH SUNDAY SCHOOL.

The 100th Anniversary of Robert Raikes, Founder of the Sunday School Movement, Was Observed.

The anniversary of the death of Robert Raikes, the founder of the Sunday school movement, who died in England one hundred years ago, was fittingly celebrated in Princess Street Methodist church on Sunday. The day was marked by lowering clouds and a drizzling rain, but nevertheless large crowds were present at all three services.

The pulpit in the morning was occupied by Rev. Samuel Selley, pastor of Queen Street Methodist church. He chose as his subject, Isaiah lii, 13: "All the children shall be taught of the Lord and all they people shall enjoy peace." With many illustrations he pointed out how the Sunday school had benefited the church in many ways; in fact the church could not live without the Sunday school. His sermon was forceful and convincing.

In the afternoon an open rally was held in which all the classes participated. A history of the Sunday school movement originated by Robert Raikes, was read by Miss Celeste Sherbino, also a history of Raikes' life. Five-minute addresses were given by leading men of the school.

In the evening, the church was filled to the doors to listen to the song service rendered by the choir. That powerful anthem, "Send Out Thy Light," was magnificently rendered by the choir, assisted by E. T. Trimble, Mr. Trimble and William Mack rendered "My Faith Looks Up to Thee" in perfect harmony. Miss Ivernie Jenkins, a rising soloist, charmed everyone with her voice in "The Shepherd's Tune." William Mack's fine tenor voice was heard at its best in "The Ninety and Nine." "There Is a Land of Pure Delight" was sung by Misses Grace Mitchell, Celeste Sherbino and Messrs. William Mack and F. H. Newman in a fitting manner.

The pastor, Rev. F. G. Robinson, spoke for a short time from the first six verses of Matthew xviii, on the simplicity of a child. Just before the service closed, Mr. Trimble sang a new setting of "Abide With Me," in his brilliant style.

A MISSIONARY FROM INDIA

Spoke in the First Baptist Church on Sunday.

Rev. R. E. Smith, B.A., late of Coomada, India, occupied the pulpit of the First Baptist church on Sunday morning, and spoke in a very interesting manner of the work of Christian missions in that great country.

The heathen part of the population is in such dense moral and spiritual darkness that their case is deplorable. They are so bound by superstitious fear of demons, and the power of evil spirits, that they are afraid to move out of the beaten tracks of their ancestors, even in their secular employment. Of those who become Christians, however, many suffer severe persecution, and many endure much hardship for the cause of Christ.

Mr. Smith gave a brief history of a little church of native Christians organized five years ago. The devotion of its members to the church's interests, their liberality, and their enterprise to reach their fellowmen would put many a Canadian church to shame.

At the Bible school session Mr. Smith gave an account of a Sunday school "Rally Day" in a native Sunday school, which was both interesting and amusing.

JAIL REPORT FOR YEAR.
There Were Altogether 148 Prisoners in Custody.

Charles H. Corbett, governor, has just issued his report for the year ending Sept. 30th. The report shows that during the year there were in custody 148 males; 12 females; total, 160. The religious denomination of the prisoners committed was as follows: Roman Catholic, males, 61; females, 2; Church of England, males 45 and 1 female; Presbyterians, 15 males and 2 females; Methodists, 17 males and 3 females; other denominations, 1.

There were forty males married and three females married. There were seventeen males, who could not read or write and three females. Thirteen males were reported temperate and four females.

The daily cost, per prisoner, was ten cents. The greatest number of prisoners confined at any one time was 28 males and 6 females, and the lowest six males and one female. Of the prisoners there were Canadians, 100; English, 15; Irish, 16; Scotch, 10; United States, 6.

NO FEAR FOR MISSIONARIES.
Cable From Rev. Dr. Kilborn Assures Friends.

There is no fear now in missionary circles as to the danger to missionaries working in China where the recent riots took place. The following cablegram was received from Rev. Dr. Kilborn at the Methodist mission rooms on Saturday from Cheng-Tu, China: "Situation is unchanged. Telegraphic communication re-established. Unable to work at present. Are all well and safe." It was sent on Saturday.

The fact that there is direct communication with the centre of hostilities, Cheng-Tu, is an assurance that things have become quiet again.

DEATH OF GEO. M. REYNOLDS.
Former Kingstonian Passed Away at Riverside, Cal.

Utica, N.Y., Observer.
A former Kingstonian passed away at Riverside, Cal., on September 21st, in the person of Geo. M. Reynolds, who was one of the city's most respected citizens and prominent pioneer merchants. He conducted one of the largest mercantile establishments in Southern California and the November last celebrated the twenty-fifth anniversary as a merchant in that city. Deceased was fifty years of age, and left Kingston, for Riverside, in 1880. He is survived by his wife and one son, Charles Reynolds.

The Late Mrs. Smart.
The pleasant recollections of a summer colony from Utica, N.Y., at Thousand Island Park are blurred and saddened by news of the sudden death of Mrs. Thomas Smart, of Philadelphia, sister of Mrs. Robert Gage, of this city. For Mrs. Smart and her family were of that colony, and delightful members of it. On receipt of the sad news Mrs. Gage and her daughter, Mrs. T. H. Farrell, immediately departed for Philadelphia. The deceased leaves, besides her husband and son, two daughters, the Misses Frances and Marion Smart, who have many friends here. Mrs. Smart has of late been busy with preparations for the marriage of her daughter, Miss Frances Smart, to Dawson Paul of Philadelphia, that event having been planned for early October.

Record Quarter's Exports.
During the quarter ending Sept. 30th the declared value of exports from Kingston to the United States was \$119,773.91, an increase of \$16,707.22 over the same quarter of 1910, and the largest quarterly value of exports in the history of the Kingston consulate. The Kingston consulate is now almost paying for itself.
