A SATISFACTORY YEAR

ENDED BY THE KINGSTON GENERAL HOSPITAL.

All Money Received is Used in Improvements—The Governors Regret the Departure of Rev. Dr. Mackie.

An interesting meeting of the board of governors of the Kingston General Hospital was held on Monday afternoon; fifteen members being present. The report for September from the committee of management was received with a great deal of satisfaction, and considered most gratifying. Being the last month of the hospital year, it is, of course, important to have the receipts and expenditure for the whole twelve months and showed that in all departments of the hospital it had been a very satisfactory year. Of course, it is not the desire of the governors to accumulate a surplus or have bank accounts to their credit, but all money received is expended in improvements to increase the efficiency of the institution.

The visiting governors, through A. F. Chown, made a verbal report, having examined the premises and noticed a great improvement in nearly every department since they had the privilege of inspecting before. The medical superintendent also brought in his report, giving 117 patients admitted and 137 discharged during the month.

The chairman, on behalf of the board, gave a hearty welcome to Dr. Bogart, who, though long a warm friend of the hospital, has but lately taken his place as a governor of the institution. The chairman, J. A. Mines, made a very feeling reference to the loss the hospital would sustain in the departure of Rev. Dr. Mackie, who leaves shortly to take up his residence in the old land. He had shown himself a true friend to the institution, not only being a regular attendant at the meetings of the governors and often giving his practical advice, but also in his intercourse with men and women outside, always saying a good word for the institution. Reference was also made to pastoral visits made by himself, and also the kind visits made by Mrs. Mackie who regularly visited the hospital with fruit and other delicacies for the ward patients. These visits will be greatly missed after their departure.

Dr. Mackie made a very interesting reply. Being one of the oldest governors in connection with the institution he well remembers in its crude formative condition when there were no trained nurses, but with such facilities as they had they cared for the sick and suffering of the city. Now as he looked at the institution and compared it with the past, he saw what strides the Kingston General Hospital had made and what a benefit such an institution is to the city. He wishes still to retain his membership on the board, and would look forward to the time when he should again cross the ocean, and pay, at least, a visit.

It was decided to hold a rummage sale about the middle of October and a sale of fancy and other articles about the middle of November.

ALD. HARRISON'S SCHEME

To Build Upon Vacant Acres in West End of Kingston.

At the board of works' meeting, on Monday afternoon, T. F. Harrison presented a plan of a new sub-division, bounded by Beverley, Union and Centre streets, which comprises eleven acres, and is owned by local and outside men, who propose to make it into a beautiful residential section, with building restrictions. The lots are large and roomy, being 50 to 125 feet frontage. The company is asking the city to accept as a gift two streets and enough extra land to make a narrow park, twenty-five feet wide, through each street, similar to American residential streets. The scheme would beautify the west end, and enhance the values of other property, besides giving an impetus to building, as a number of prominent men are awaiting the action of the city council in regard to opening up the proposed streets. The board of works looks with favor upon the proposition and no doubt will recommend that the request of Mr. Harrison be granted. Many thousands of dollars would be added to the city's assessment in a short time.

The narrow park scheme is a good one, and it is a pity that other of Kingston's streets were not built with a view to making them more beautiful. The new building section is to be called "Kensington Place."

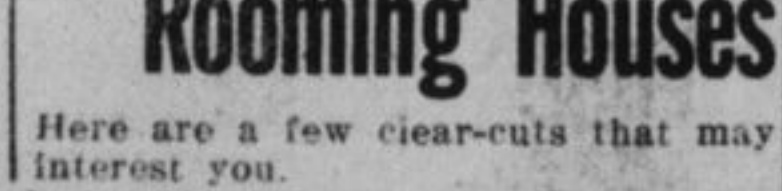
