**BORDEN TO BE URGED**  
TO DECIDE TRANSCONTINENTAL RAILWAY POLICY.

The Conservatives Have Feared That the American Terminals Will Share Traffic From Subsidized Roads.

Ottawa, Oct. 2.—Looming up before the Borden government is the problem of the future of the National Transcontinental and Grand Trunk Pacific railway projects. The conservative party is being called to determine whether the project, designed to give the dominion the straightest and highest grade transcontinental trunk line will be operated with an eye single to insuring the movement of east and west traffic through Canadian ports. All indications are that there will soon be a "show down" between the parties concerned.

This railway project was begun by the Laurier government in 1903. The government is building the National Transcontinental railway, a line 1,895 miles long, from Moncton, N.B., to Winnipeg. It will cost more than \$200,000,000. The Grand Trunk Pacific railway company, controlled by the Grand Trunk railway, is building under government bond guarantee, 1,755 miles, from Winnipeg to Prince Rupert, B.C., on the Pacific coast. Under terms of its contract the Grand Trunk Pacific is to operate the National Transcontinental, paying a rental equivalent to three per cent. of the cost of construction. The terms of the contract require the Grand Trunk Pacific to ship all export traffic, not otherwise routed by the shipper, through Canadian ports. The Grand Trunk railway, parent of the Grand Trunk Pacific, was subject to no such contract, although the conservative party in 1903 endeavored to amend the law to that end.

Since that time the Grand Trunk railway acquired the Canada Atlantic, which gives it an outlet from Northern Ontario to Noyau Junction, Que., where it connects with the Vermont Central, which recently has acquired large terminal facilities at Providence, R.I. One of the arguments advanced when it was requested that the necessary legislation, was that Providence as well as Montreal, which is jealously a part of the year, would be an export outlet for traffic originating in the Canadian west.

This project has been sharply criticized by the conservatives in parliament. To them it threatens the diversion of traffic from Canadian ports. They want to know why the Grand Trunk interests are not developing St. John as an ocean terminal as well as Providence. Since the Providence project various interests in Boston have forwarded plans to insure the Grand Trunk an entry into that city. The conservative party here, which has fought reciprocity largely because it would divert east and west traffic into north and south channels, is suspicious of the whole New England policy of the Grand Trunk. Rumors have been current in Canada that the Grand Trunk interests are lukewarm about the prospect of taking over and operating the expensive National Transcontinental railway further east than Cochrane, Ont., where the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario intersects the National Transcontinental. Here is the point where shipment be diverted southward to Providence via the old Canada Atlantic and Vermont Central lines.

**FRANK HUBBELL KILLED**  
BY BURSTING WHEEL.

Fatal Accident to Well-known Farmer Near Stirling.  
Belleville, Oct. 3.—Frank Hubbell, a highly-respected farmer, living on the town line, about three miles west of Stirling, was grinding the knives about the wheel. So great was the force with which they were driven that they penetrated the brain. One large fragment of the wheel struck Mr. Hubbell on the leg and the limb was crushed.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over the World.  
The Ontario cabinet meets to-day, to decide on bye-elections.  
General Madere swept Mexico in the general elections on Monday.  
Delegates are arriving in Toronto for the great Ecumenical conference.  
Lady Drummond is seriously ill in the Royal Victoria hospital, Montreal.  
Louis Karousi, an insane prisoner, hanged himself in jail at Sault Ste. Marie.  
Sir Thomas Tait is spoken of as the new chairman of the Transcontinental commission.  
Two inches of snow fell in Porcupine on Thursday night, but disappeared during the next day.  
Premier McBride has chosen to remain chief of the conservative administration in British Columbia.  
Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt was thrown from her horse, on Saturday, and is confined to the house from injuries received.  
J. E. Maxse, editor of the National Review, is arranging for a demonstration at Chelsea, Eng., to celebrate the defeat of reciprocity.  
Charles Laroux, a C.T.R. brakeman, living at Belleville, had his right leg cut off below the knee in the freight yards at Tremont street, Toronto.  
Six Mexicans, one of them a Baptist preacher, were poisoned at Sanderson, Texas, on Sunday. They met death presumably from strychnine put in a flour barrel.

Mrs. G. M. Crawley, of Newark, N.J., kidnapped forty-five years ago when a child, has received word that her father died in the Montreal Home for the Aged.  
Alexander Trudeau, of Montreal, ten years of age, when going to school on Friday, was run-over by an ice wagon drawn by two 1,200 pound horses. The little fellow was instantly killed.  
Judge Melhery, of New York, advocates the establishment of a public whipping post and the employment of a prize fighter to punish vice beaters. He said jails nowadays are good hotels.  
W. H. Hearst, the newspaper man of New York, is out for Champ Clark, for president of the United States for 1912. Hearst's name was mentioned at one time as a probable candidate.

A. C. Lee, of San Francisco, was struck by a train at Belle Isle, N.Y., on Saturday morning, realizing he had but a few minutes to live, he wrote in his note book a message of love to his mother. It read: "Mrs. A. S. Lee, La Belle, Fla., good-bye. Love to all."  
High Manchu circles are trying to "westernize" Chinese society in a new way. It is to be the fashion to wear a great variety of western gowns. One order alone has amounted to over \$200,000.  
A. J. Jackson, for forty-eight years jailer at Lindsay, has resigned. In point of service he was the oldest jailer in Ontario. George Andrew Balfour, of Emily township, in Victoria county, has been appointed to succeed him.  
Sir Charles Lucas, head of the Dominion department of the colonial office, who has retired, is to be succeeded by Sir H. W. Just, chief secretary of the imperial conference, who made an extensive tour of Canada last spring.

J. W. Sawyer, of Grand Junction, Col., sixty years of age, weakened in body and spirit in January, 1910, began on a diet of raw vegetables, cereals and fruit, not eating cooked food in any form, is now strong as a young man.  
Capt. T. H. R. Bulkeley, of the Scots Guards, and Capt. Bauer, of the Rifle Brigade, a son of the late Gen. Sir Redvers Buller, are coming to Canada as A.D.C.'s to the Duke of Connaught. Capt. Worthington, of the Army Medical Corps, will be the court physician.  
A new house on Grove street, occupied by William Conhove, Belleville, was gutted by fire on Sunday. The kitchen, dining-room and a portion of the upper storey of the building were burned. It is thought the blaze originated from a stove in the kitchen.  
The government of Prince Edward Island is in a dilemma of a dilemma. There are thirty members in the island legislature, fourteen are liberals and fourteen are conservatives, with two vacant seats. The question is, a provincial general election or not.  
That the farmers of the prairie provinces will receive \$200,000,000 for their grain crop this year, although the grain as a whole will grade lower than in former years, is the statement made at Calgary, by R. S. Brown, superintendent of the Central western branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce.  
It has been decided to have a captain's guard on duty at Government House, Ottawa, during the residence of Duke of Connaught. This guard will be furnished in the meantime by the Governor-General's Foot Guards, until arrangements have been completed for a detachment of the permanent force being stationed at Ottawa.

**MAY REACH ONE MILLION.**

Succession Dues Are \$950,000, and Has Another Month.  
Toronto, Oct. 3.—Succession duties collected in Ontario by the provincial treasurer, for September totaled \$85,705. The total collections for the fiscal year to date total \$950,000, which exceeds the provincial treasurer's estimate by \$250,000. October is the last month in the fiscal year and it is not unlikely that the succession duties will total \$1,000,000.

**MAINE STILL TO BE DRY.**

Final Count Gives Prohibition Party 748 Majority.  
Augusta, Me., Oct. 3.—As the result of testimony presented under oath by the town clerks of Limestone, Westfield and Athens before the governor and council here, the final figures for the repeal of prohibition in this state give a majority of 748 no in place of the 26 ye majority.
