SPENT PENSION MONEY

HOLDING THE FORTS

TURKS REINFORCED BY THOUSANDS OF ARABS.

Two Dirigible Balloons Sent to Tripoli—Italy Declines Services of Armenians, Albanians and Greeks.

Rome, Oct. 3.—The latest word here says that all Italians and other Europeans, except monks and priests, have fled from Tripoli fearing a bombardment, but the Turkish troops, reinforced by thousands of Arabs from the plains, are holding the forts. It is realized here that bloody battles will result from Italy trying to land troops at Tripoli.

Two dirigible balloons with trained aeronautic corps have been sent to Tripoli. The Italian government has declined offers of thousands of Armenians, Albanians and Greeks to go to Tripoli to fight the Turks.

Britain Seizes Turkish Boats.

Southampton, Eng., Oct. 3.—The British customs authorities have seized four naval launches, each of twenty-five tons, armed with quick-firers, bound for Turkey. Six similar craft were delivered before the outbreak of the war.

Has Bombardment Begun?

Rome, Italy, Oct. 3.—Wireless message received here today relayed from the fleet of Tripoli says that the bombardment of the town has begun. While there were indications last night that shelling might begin this morning there has been no official confirmation of the statement that it had actually commenced. In view of Turkey's plainly pacific attitude, it is doubted here if a shot will be fired from the ships of Italy until some manifestation on the part of Turkey.

Bombarding Tripoli.

Paris, Oct. 3.—Le Temps has a despatch from Rome to the effect that an official despatch says the bombardment of Tripoli began at ten o'clock this morning. Heliograph messages repeated say that Italian ships are shelling in several places, and the inhabitants are fleeing to the country.
