**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.**

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE
head of a family or any male over 18
years old may homestead a quarter
section of land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.
The applicant must appear in person at
the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-
Agent office in the district where he
wishes to settle and arrangements
may be made at any agency, on certain
conditions, by father, mother, son,
daughter, brother or sister of intended
homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon
and cultivation of the land in each of
three years. Homestead may be
within nine miles of his home and/or
a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned
and occupied by him or by his father
mother, son, daughter, brother or
sister.

In certain districts a homesteader is
good status may pre-empt a quarter
section along roadsides. Price
\$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon
the homestead or pre-emption al-
most in each of six years from
date of homestead entry (including the
time required to earn homestead
status) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has ex-
tended his homestead rights and cannot obtain
a pre-emption may enter for a pur-
chased homestead in certain districts.

Cost, six months in each of three
years, cultivate fifty acres and erec-
t a house worth \$300.00.




