TIED UP BY THE FOG

VESSELS WERE DELAYED ON FRIDAY NIGHT.

Steamer Alexandria had to Put Back to Gananoque on Her Trip up From Montreal—Traffic on the River was Practically Held up—Marine Notes.

Traffic on the river, Friday night, was practically tied up, as a result of a very heavy fog.

The steamer Stormont, loaded with steel rails, on her way from Sydney, to Port William, was held up for several hours, on her trip to Kingston, as a result of the fog. The vessel left the lift lock at three o'clock, on Friday afternoon, and it is usual to make this trip in seven hours, but it was five o'clock in the morning, before the steamer arrived in port.

The steamer Alexandria, on her trip up from Montreal, also had trouble. After leaving Gananoque the fog was so thick that she had to put back to Gananoque again, and as a result it was 2 a.m. when the Alexandria pulled into Folger's wharf, to unload a general cargo.

The steamer Dundell, on her way up the river, with a cargo of iron also got into the fog and was several hours late in arriving at the dock, where she unloaded. The iron is for the shipbuilding company.

The steamer Mississippi was in port, on Saturday, from Gananoque. The schooner Julia B. Merrill, which has been unloading coal at Collis Bay, cleared, Saturday afternoon, for Oswego, to load coal for Anglin's.

M. T. Co's elevator: The tug Emerson cleared for Montreal, with oil barges Nos. 8 and 9, the steamer Turret Cape arrived Saturday morning, from Port William, and discharged 25,000 bushels of barley; the tug Hall cleared for Montreal, with three grain barges; the steamer Kingston cleared for Port William, with the barge Melrose in tow, as far as Port Dalhousie.

At Swift's wharf: Steamer Aetna down from bay ports, to-day; steamer Rideau King arrived from Ottawa last night and cleared again this morning; steamers Dundell and Belleisle due to go down and up respectively, Sunday.

The steamer John Rolph is, discharging a cargo of coal from Erie.

The M. T. Co's barge Cobourg unloaded coal at Kingston dry-dock this morning.
