SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE HEAD of a family or any male over 18 years of age may obtain a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the homesteader.

Two days before he died in May last, Fred Cunningham, of Oakland, Ont., endorsed on his policy for \$2,000 on the Canadian Order of Circles a request to have the whole amount paid to his wife, leaving the children out. The matter is now before the courts.
