THE LOCAL ELECTIONS.

There is still uncertainty with regard to the local election. It is not decided that there shall be a series of bye-elections, in order to fill the vacancies caused by local members running for the commons, or whether there shall be a general appeal, with the expectation on the part of the government, that it shall make a clean sweep of the province.

EARL GREY'S DEPARTURE.

Canada bids farewell to the governor-general, Earl Grey, and to Lady Grey and her daughters, with sincere regret. Not in many years, if ever, has any one occupying a vice-regal position, entered so heartily into the life of the people, for he simply followed his natural disposition in becoming a citizen of the country which he governed.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Laurier has finished his work for the time being and finished it grandly.

Mr. Gage's idea is that if the big interests are represented on the new government—and it seems they are—and are not watched they will get ahead of the people. Nothing surer.

An Ottawa lawyer is said to have been so devoted to his party as to have given up two months of his time in order to serve it—without remuneration. And without promise of reward?

The naval question will be one of the first rocks against which the ship of state will bump. Some damage will result, and it could have been avoided. The captain of the ship deserves his worries.

There may be a local general election this fall, but if there is one-eighth of the province will not be consulted because there has not been an enumeration of the electors. The people have a right to representation.

A Champaign, M.P., of Battleford, thinks his constituents will expect him to get all he can for it, and he will support the government. He expects a reign of grab and he is going to be in line for action.

The Ottawa Citizen worked itself into a terrible passion because the late government had awarded a contract for dredging in St. John harbour. The accusation being without foundation of course, the Citizen will gracefully withdraw it, with apologies.

The press continues the diverting occupation of accounting, or trying to account, for the change of government in Canada. The causes assigned differ materially, but there is concurrence on one point—that national and religious prejudices had a great deal to do with the change.

The Toronto Tories are protesting over the appointment of a converted liberal in the Borden cabinet. If they are logical, they will protest against R. L. Borden holding the position of conservative premier, for Mr. Borden is a converted liberal, having left the party in 1891 under Tupper influence.

Another election next year. This is now the promise. The occasion will be the redistribution of representation, and the people will have occasion to revise the opinions they expressed in the late elections. Meanwhile the government will have an opportunity to declare itself in the naval and other questions.

Hon. Messrs. Fielding and Graham will be members of parliament ere long. They are wanted there and seats have already been placed at their disposal, and seats they can win against any opposition. In financial and transportation matters the voices of these men will be heard to advantage.
