### COULD NOT GET QUORUM FOR SESSION.

Although There Was Important  
Business Before the Members—  
Chairman and Medical Health  
Officer Alone in Attendance—  
Matters to be Taken Up.

Although the board of health had important business on hand, Chairman McLeod could not get a quorum for a meeting called on Monday afternoon at four o'clock. The chairman and the medical health officer, Dr. A. R. B. Williamson, put in an appearance, but the other members were conspicuous by their absence.

It might be stated, that up-to-date, complaints to the number of about six hundred and fifty have been registered with the police about the garbage system, installed some time ago.

That is to say, that this number of complaints have been received about the garbage man not calling at the houses. These complaints are handed over to the men who have the contract for the collection, by William McCammon, the sanitary inspector, and he reports having notified the contractors to go to work. It is just possible that the garbage system will come up before the board for discussion at its next meeting as quite a number of complaints have been received about the way in which the work has been handled.

The board was to have taken up the matter of the epidemic of scarlet fever. It is the opinion of the chairman that there should be a better system of fumigating homes.

Another matter which has to be taken up by the board, is the slip at the foot of Princess street, which has been reported to be in an unsanitary condition, and about which so many complaints have been made.

The chairman will endeavor to have a meeting of the board as soon as possible.

## ABERNETHY'S

### TENDER WAS REFUSED

AS IT WAS RECEIVED A DAY TOO LATE.

T. W. Milo Awarded Contract for  
Painting City Hall Interior—W.  
J. Savage's Tender Was \$80  
Lower.

The city council last evening decided that when a tender was not received at the time designated, it could not be considered. Accordingly, it awarded the contract for painting the interior of the city hall to T. W. Milo, whose tender was \$863, although W. J. Savage tendered for \$843, or \$8 less. The tender of the latter was not received till the day after the time specified.

Ald. Ross, chairman of the property committee, explained that as Mr. Savage's tender was not received in time, it was not a legal tender, and therefore, could not fairly be considered.

Ald. Elliott held that just as soon as Mr. Savage's tender was opened by the committee it became a legal tender, and should be considered. He did not think the time should be drawn so fine in regard to the time of receiving tenders.

Ald. Linton said it was impossible to tell when Mr. Savage's tender was until it was opened. When it was opened, it was seen that it was dated September 1st, or a day too late.

Ald. Bailey upheld the chairman. He regretted that the city could not take advantage of the lower figure of Mr. Savage.

Ald. Elliott moved in amendment to the committee's recommendation that the tender of Mr. Savage be accepted, as it is \$8 less than Mr. Milo's.

Ald. Hoag pointed out that if on August 31st there had been a quorum of the property committee present at the meeting called, the tender of Mr. Savage would not have been considered, as it was not received on the day of closing.

Ald. Harrison moved in amendment to the amendment that the matter be referred to the city solicitor, and that the contract be awarded in accordance with his legal opinion.

Ald. Avent remarked that none of the tenders need be accepted. The council could very easily refuse Mr. Milo's tender and accept Mr. Savage's. There was no legal question at stake at all.

Ald. Ross said that if the amendment went through, it would mean that henceforth the receiving of a tender at a certain hour would mean nothing. He said that if Ald. Elliott was not biased, he would not take the stand he did.

Ald. Elliott objected to such a charge. He was not biased, he declared.
