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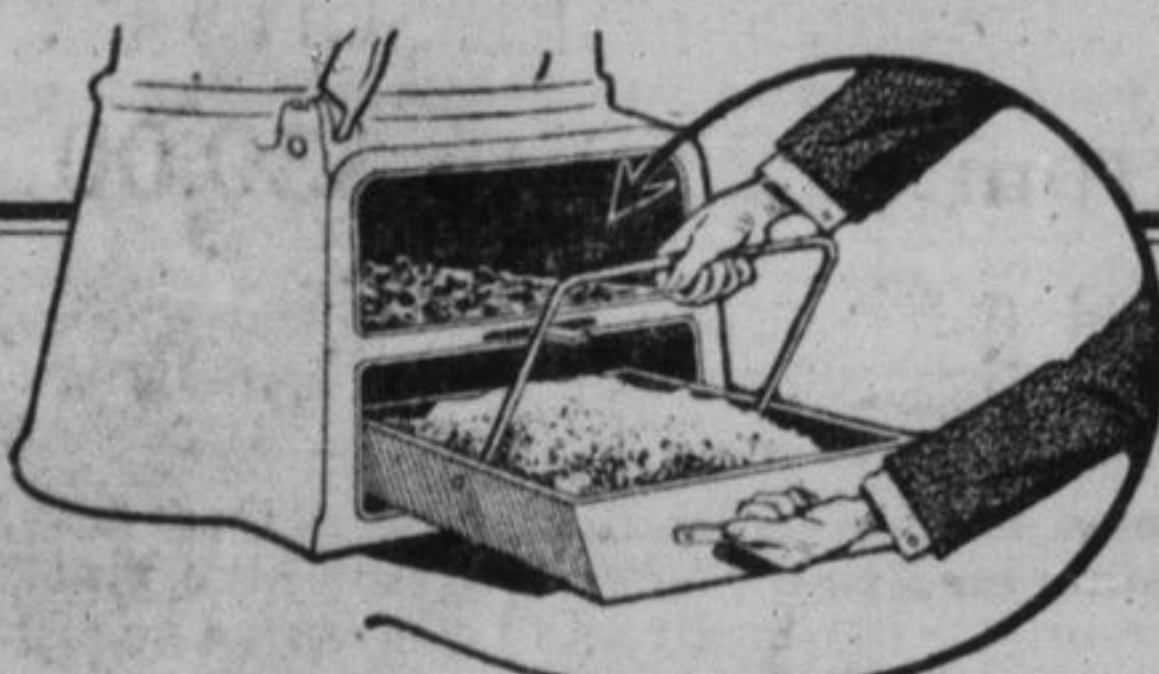
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CITY COUNCIL MEETS

THE BUSINESS IT TRANSACTED ON MONDAY EVENING?

Forty-two Street Lights to be Added—The Council is Asked to Provide a Children's Shelter.

After a three months' vacation, the city council again met in regular session on Monday evening. In attendance were: Mayor Graham and Alds. Armstrong, Bailey, Carson, Couper, Jagston, Elliott, Givens, Hanley, Harrison, Harty, Hoag, Kent, Litton, McCann, McCartney, Rigney, Ross.

These communications were read: Edward Keele, submitting a bill of \$2,700 for damages on account of having to close place of business.

The North American Smelting Co., Ltd., asking extension of time to complete smelter.

A. McCartney, for removal of tree in front of house No. 246 University avenue.

W. T. Gibbard and T. F. Harrison, making application to have a street opened from Centre to Beverley streets.

C. S. Kirkpatrick, making claim for compensation for injuries sustained on account of unlighted excavation.

William McCann, making application to have tree cut down in front of 333 Queen street.

L. K. Lake, M.D., making application to erect porches on William street.

Albert H. Daly and James Melphran re drain Mack street.

Albert Neal re installation of brick plant in city.

C. B. Russell, managing director of Morrisburg Tack Manufacturing company, re location of factory in Kingston.

Siemens Bros., dynamo works, London, Eng., re fire alarm and police signal system.

Alfred E. Dean, secretary of Kingston Old Boys' Association, of Chicago, tendering thanks of association for reception and entertainment.

H. Jennings and others, asking for an arc light corner of Mack and Frontenac streets.

James Yule and others, for a light at the corner of Alfred and Mack streets.

Secretary board of health, recommending construction of drains in Earl, Sydenham, Wellington, Johnson and Montreal streets.

The Finance Report.
The following report of the finance committee was adopted:

On the communication of John Macdonald, secretary-treasurer board of education, making application for extra \$5,000, that the request be not granted.

On the communication from the Y. M.C.A. re exemption from taxes, that the request be granted.

On the communication of Capt. Harry Turner asking recognition of the agreement between the city and the Salvation Army re shelter, that the request be granted.

That William Dougherty be refunded \$2.60, the amount of sewer rental, having been charged local improvement tax.

On the communication of Edward O'Keefe asking the city to pay him \$150 that the request be not granted.

That the following in a statement to the credit of the different standing committees to date, viz.: Fire and light, \$1,220; parks, \$135; city property, \$1,000; garbage, \$625; industries, \$184.

The appropriations of the board of works, contingencies, printing and stationery have been used up.

That the accounts of McKelvey & Birch for \$52 and \$26, also that of H. Milne \$40 and J. S. R. McCann \$18.50, be paid.

That the accounts of the Standard Publishing company, \$15, and the light department, \$62.40, be not paid.

That the communication of J. P. McMillan re delegation of the different municipalities to the departure of Earl Dufferin be filed.

The committee on finance and accounts recommend the adoption of the annexed memorandum as a basis of settlement of the claims of the city in respect of the government lands now held under license of occupation by the Kingston and Pembroke Railway company with this qualification that provision be made for the maintenance of a sufficient outlet for the North street sewer to deep water with the right to the city to enter upon the lands through which such outlet passes for the purpose of repairing and reconstructing such outlet sewer to deep water with the right to the city to enter upon the lands through which such outlet passes for the purpose of repairing and reconstructing such outlet sewer from time to time in perpetuity.

The Kingston and Pembroke Railway Co. should grant:

1st—The opening of Bay street to the water.

2nd—The opening of King street to the water.

3rd—Grant to the city council of that parcel of land under license as to occupation, bounded by King street, the bay market and the railroad tracks.

4th—The opening of Ontario street to the water.

5th—Grant to the city the control of the land bounded by Ontario street, Bridge street, and the water.

6th—Grant to the city the control of the water rights in front of the city hall, bounded by Brock street, Clarence street and the Kingston and Pembroke property. (Sgd.) W. P. HARKER.

Location of New Lights.

The light, heat and power committee recommended that forty new arc lamps be placed throughout the city as follows, the various locations being fixed by the city engineer and Manager Folger, and the list being arranged in order to its relative importance as compared with the others:

Barrie street above Deacon street.

The committee was given authority to purchase fifty additional lamps and cut-outs at these contract prices: Lamps, \$35.25 each; cut-outs, \$7.55 each.

Ald. Hoag had several suggestions to make regarding the placing of the new lights, and Ald. Elliott promised to have them considered.

The arc lamp in the city park will be moved, and six Tungsten lights will be placed along the walk between West and Stuart streets.

Property Recommendations.

On recommendation of the property committee it was decided to accept the offer of the Misses Allen to sell to the corporation a tract of land at the end of Lower Bagot street for \$1,000, to be used as a dumping ground.

The tender of W. Crallier, at \$1 a week, for removal of garbage and refuse from the market square, was accepted.

The property committee also recommended that the tender of T. W. Milo for painting the city hall at a cost of \$563, and that of the H. W. Newman Electric company for electric lighting, etc., for \$114, be accepted.

All the above recommendations were adopted.

Two reports of the board of works, of date June 29th and August 31st, were adopted.

A by-law was passed to amend another by-law, whereby red lights, instead of white ones, must be placed at excavations in the streets at nights.

Children's Aid Matters.

Rev. Prof. Alexander Laird, president of the Children's Aid Society, addressed the council, and introduced the society's agent, J. C. McConachie, who told the mayor and aldermen of a problem confronting him. The law required that all cities provide shelters for children between twelve and sixteen years of age. Kingston had no such thing. The council had made an arrangement with the Salvation Army for a temporary shelter for children taken off the streets for being out late at night. The arrangement had proven unsatisfactory, and was now annulled. He hoped that the council could deal with the matter. Mr. McConachie also asked that the council provide him with an office.

On motion of Ald. Harrison, the requests of Mr. McConachie were referred to the finance and property with the committee, and give them further information.
