R.C.H.A. FIELD SPORTS

HELD AT BARRIEFIELD ON WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

The Events Were Enjoyed by a Large Crowd—Some New Features Introduced—Winners of the Various Events.

The first of the finals of the sports in connection with the R. C. H. A. annual field day, were run off at Barriefield commons on Wednesday afternoon, and with the new features introduced in this year's program, easily outclassed any that have been held in recent years. The weather in the morning threatened to be very nasty, but early in the afternoon the sun came out and ideal weather conditions prevailed.

Other years the sports were held in Lake Ontario Park, but those who were at the head of affairs thought that as Barriefield commons was public property, the tearing up of the turf by the horses and gun carriages would not amount to much.

The preliminaries were run off Monday and Tuesday, and the winners were thus qualified to enter the finals. It was impossible to get through with the whole programme, and the remainder will be run off this week.

The R. C. H. A. band, under the leadership of Bandmaster Light, was present the whole afternoon, and furnished excellent music. A large crowd was present and stayed until the last event was finished at dusk, and during the whole time were loud in their praises whenever the soldiers displayed themselves well.

The men of the two batteries practised for a number of days in advance of the events. Every day in the saddle and as well acquainted with their horses as with their fellow comrades, they pulled off some remarkable feats of strength and skill. The judgment, nerve and skill displayed in the different numbers on the programme was keenly enjoyed by everyone, and all felt well repaid for going across the bridge.

One of the new features introduced, and one which was magnificently carried out, was the artillery drive. The working out of this displayed remarkable horsemanship and unerring judgment on the part of the leading drivers. It was one of the best events of the afternoon. Tuesday, while practising, one of the guns turned too sharply, while making a turn, with the result that it was completely turned over two or three times, and one of the wheels was shattered.

During one of the events, the spectators were treated to a real wild west exhibition of broncho bucking. The mount of Sergeant Sawyer took a notion that it would like to do a little contrary work, and started in to do some real western bucking. Sergeant Sawyer had a hard time to hold his seat, but showed good horsemanship, and when at length the beast was conquered, performed the best feat of the day by clearing everything in the riding and jumping.

Section tent pegging—C sub-section "A" battery, B sub-section "B" battery.

Individual riding and jumping—Sergt. Ecclestone, Gr. Aldridge, Br. Sawyer.

Section riding and jumping—B sub-section "B" battery, A sub-section "A" battery.

Wrestling on horseback—(semi-finals) C sub-section "B" battery, D sub-section "A" battery.

On and off race—Gr. Guyatt, Dr. Guy, Br. Coulson.

Wrestling on horseback—(finals) A sub-section "A" battery, C sub-section "B" battery.

The remainder of the sports will likely be run off Saturday.

A FINE CHOIR FROM WALES.

Gave a Concert in St. Andrew's Hall Last Evening.

People of the city who missed hearing the Royal Welsh Choir, in St. Andrew's church hall, on Wednesday evening, missed a treat, the like of which has not been heard in the city in years. The choir consists of twenty-five men, the best of their kind in Wales. The committee of the Welsh national memorial to the late King Edward VII has engaged this choir to tour Canada and the United States on behalf of this great movement against consumption. They began their journey on September 29th. The chief soloist is Evan Lewis. The choir arrived in the city without anyone here having any knowledge of its coming, due to a misunderstanding with the advance agent, who booked it for October 11th, but failed to engage a hall or to advertise. O. F. Felgmann arranged to have the choir give a complimentary concert in St. Andrew's hall, and several hundred attended. All through the programme numerous encores were called for. H. W. Spelling acted ably in the capacity of chairman. The choir will return to Kingston at a later date.

IN MARINE CIRCLES

MANY VESSELS HAVE LIGHTERED AT THIS PORT.

The Steamer Corunna Aground at Welcome Islands Has Been Released—Not as Badly Damaged as at First Expected—Marine Notes of Interest.

A very large number of vessels have lighterred at this port this summer, and this has been due to the fact that the water has been very low. Vessels have been compelled to lighter wheat here, for the simple reason that the ordinary cargoes they have been carrying through the lower canals could not be handled. As a result this has made a great deal of unnecessary work, quite a fleet of vessels calling here which would not have called otherwise. Quite a number have also discharged here this week being one of the busiest of the season.

Marine men coming into port are still talking about the rough weather which has been experienced during the past week or so. The vessels have had a great tossing about and it is indeed a miracle that no marine disasters occurred. One was reported, but luckily the report was a false one. Quite a number of excitement followed a report that a well-known vessel running out of Kingston had been lost in a storm on Lake Erie.

There was not a word of truth in the rumor and how the report was started is indeed a mystery. At the time the vessel was reported to have gone down with all on board, she was snug in a harbor, some distance from Kingston.

The first of the ribs of the new government boat, being built at the Kingston dry docks, were placed in position Wednesday afternoon and from now on work will appear to go faster. The plans of the second boat have not been finished in Collingwood.

Movement of Vessels.

The steamer Strathcona passed up Wednesday night.

The steamer Mississauga was in port from Gananoque, to-day.

The schooner Ford River is at Richardson's wharf, loading feldspar.

The schooner Julia B. Merrill arrived from Oswego with coal for Agincourt.

The steamship John Randall arrived from Seely's Bay, and is discharging a cargo of brick at the cotton mill wharf.

The steamer Buena Vista will arrive in port, to-night, from Rideau canal ports, and will clear in the morning for Smith's Falls.

At Swift's wharf, Steamer Aletha, down from bay ports; schooner Bertie Calkins arrived from Oswego Wednesday with coal for Rideau Point this morning.

M. T. Co's elevator: The steamer Toronto, grain laden, from Port Arthur, discharged 67,000 bushels of wheat; the tug Hall is due to arrive to-night, light, from Cape Vincent, after leaving the barge Harrison there, loaded with pulp; the steamer Glenmount, loaded with rails, cleared for Port William.

The steamer Corunna which was stranded on a shoal off the Welcome Islands, was released after a portion of her cargo had been lighterred. The boat was not as badly damaged as expected and came into Port Arthur under her own steam. She is now at the C.N.R. docks, unloading the balance of her cargo after which she will go on the dry-docks for repairs. The boat's pumps are kept continually at work.
