TEACHERS' SALARIES.

The women who are employed as teachers by the Board of Education have presented a new demand for higher salaries, and the increases, which they desire to take effect at once amount to about \$4,500.

In other words, the budget this year has been passed. The salary list cannot be changed until, in the preparation of a new budget in 1912, or just before it, the salary schedule has been amended and provision is made for the increased appropriation.

In filling the vacancies on the staff

this year the school board was met with very grave difficulties. There is a scarcity of school teachers. This arises from two causes: (1) Not so many candidates are going up, the cost of training being very much greater, and the emoluments of service not being as great as in other occupations; and (2) the North-West is offering engagements to all the teachers it can find, and at distinctly higher wages.

SEEKING A SNAP VERDICT.
