SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORMS—WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family or any male over 18 years old, holding a homestead section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the office of the Surveyor General's Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, "by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader."

Duties—Six months' residence upon an acre of the land in each of three years as homesteader must be within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him as his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing can buy a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption site for six months before the date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate five acres extra. A homesteader who has earned his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

A ROW AT GANANOQUE

IN WHICH REEVE C. E. BRITTON WAS INVOLVED.

Trouble Over the Use of a Scow—William Allan Brought to Kingston for Treatment of an Injured Eye.

Gananoque, Oct. 14.—A sensational scow took place at an early hour, yesterday morning, at the wharf just below the lower dam in Gananoque river between Reeve C. E. Britton and a couple of government survey party's crew. Mr. Britton, without permission, in lighting the fifty tons of coal from the steamboat Ring-leader, in order to float her off the shoal near the mouth of Gananoque river, appropriated the government scow, owned by the survey party. Their launch ran into Gananoque river and located the scow on Thursday evening and yesterday morning, went down to find what right Mr. Britton had to the use of it, when an angry altercation followed and blows were struck. Chief Ryan was summoned, but the two men had left and the chief of the survey party was there to claim his scow. It was said the case was an error, as Mr. Britton telephoned for the use of Mitchell & Wilson's scow, which was promptly granted, and sending a crew for it, they in mistake took the government scow anchored near Robertson's coal shed. On the other hand marine men claim it as the Ring-leader was in distress at the time. The law will probably settle the case.
