TAKEN OFF AT RAPID DE PLAT
ON FRIDAY.

Barge Went Aground Few Weeks Ago, Coal Laden, on the Way to Montreal—Was Taken Off Without Damage—Marine Notes.

The large Winnipeg, of the Montreal Transportation company, which ran aground a few weeks ago at Rapid de Plat, coal-laden, on the way to Montreal, was raised on Friday, by the Lockett Wrecking company, of Angusburg. As far as can be learned, the vessel suffered only slight damage, and is at present in Barron's Point, canal. The wrecking company took hold of the work ten days ago, and made a good job of it. The Winnipeg was loaded with 11,000 tons of coal, and the boat was taken off with no having to be lightered.
