WINNIPEG RELEASED

TAKEN OFF AT RAPID DE PLAT ON FRIDAY.

Barge Went Aground Few Weeks Ago, Coal Laden, on the Way to Montreal—Was Taken Off Without Damage—Marine Notes.

The barge Winnipeg, of the Montreal Transportation company, which ran aground a few weeks ago, at Rapid de Plat, coal-laden, on the way to Montreal, was raised on Friday, by the Jackett Wrecking company, of Amherstburg. As far as can be learned, the vessel suffered only slight damage, and is at present in Parson's Point, canal. The wrecking company took hold of the work ten days ago, and made a good job of it. The Winnipeg was loaded with 11,000 tons of coal, and the boat was taken off without having to be lightened.

HOW ITALY WILL GOVERN.

Proclamation is Issued to the Inhabitants of Tripoli.

Tripoli, Oct. 14.—General Caneva has addressed a proclamation to the inhabitants, assuring them that they have not been enslaved by Italy.

On the contrary they have been liberated from the yoke under which they have been laboring for years. They will be ruled by their own chiefs under the patronage of the King of Italy. The religious and civil laws will be respected and taxes will be reduced or abolished.

The proclamation concludes by announcing that Italy desires that Tripoli shall remain the land of Islam, under the protection of Italy.

TO PRESENT TO THE PEOPLE.

A Proposition For the Erection of a Big Hotel.

On Friday evening there was a joint meeting of the hotel committee of the board of trade and the civic finance committee, when the former presented to the latter a proposition of a Boston syndicate to erect a big hotel in Kingston on the ground known as the Carruthers site on King street, and held by the board of trade. The full details are not yet ready for publication. The finance committee looked with favor upon the scheme, and decided to recommend to the city council that a by-law be placed before the people in January with regard to the part the city is asked to take in connection with the matter.
