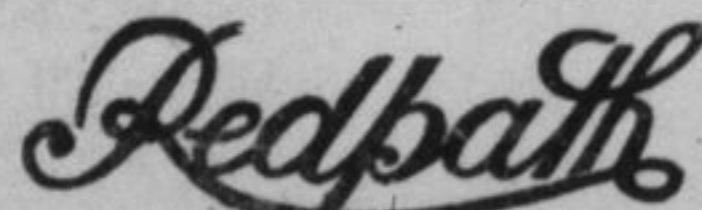

## DEDUCT BIG AMOUNT THE LOWEST IN YEARS

FROM DONNELLY COMPANY'S INTAKE PIPE CHARGES.

Waterworks Committee Will Not Pay the Amount Asked for—Booth & Co. Get the Contract for Coal.

The waterworks committee met for the first time this fall, on Monday afternoon. Those present were Alds. Carson (chairman), Armstrong, Harrison, Litton, Ross and Hanley. The chief item for discussion was the bill presented by the Donnelly Wrecking company for work done in connection with the intake pipe and the search for leaks.

The contract which was signed by the company was for \$1,184. In addition to this another bill for \$2,219.40 is presented for extras. Among the several extras which are charged are several items which are claimed to be covered in the contract and which should have been done without any extra expense. The city solicitor, Superintendent Hewitt and Ald. Carson went over the bill and, deducting the extras, which were covered under the contract, brought the bill of extras down to \$1,000.

On motion, the chairman, the superintendent and city solicitor were named as a committee to confer with Mr. Donnelly and see whether he would accept the bill as they had cut it down. A petition was received from four residents of Victoria street to have a main laid down on that street between Mack and Durban. The revenue derived would be about \$44, and it would cost over \$1,000 to lay the pipe. The petition was laid aside until more names could be added to it. Members of the committee were of the opinion that vacant lots should be taxed for a water main.

The tender of Booth & Co. for coal at \$2.85 a ton, was accepted, it being the lowest.

Mr. Jenkins was at one time connected with the late J. C. Lake in the live-oil business in Belleville. His wife pre-deceased him some years ago. One daughter, Miss Stella, a nurse of Utica, N. Y., survives.

Channels Among Thousand Islands Where Excursion Boats Usually Run Are Too Shallow Now for Put-Puts.

The St. Lawrence river is now the lowest it has been in many years. Friday the record at Clayton, N.Y., showed the water some five and one half feet below the mark of three years ago, at this date.

In the narrow channels, where the night-seeing boats run in summer, it is now so shallow small gasoline launches are unable to get through. To leave the Lake of the Isles in Wellesley Island, it is now necessary to go around by Rockport to Alexandria Bay, as the water in the International Rift is too low for navigation.

This lowering of the water has been responsible for several of the large freight boats striking bottom during the summer and either sinking or being disabled. All the docks are so high out of water that it has been necessary to build temporary cofferdams to the boats to land at, and at some places it is with considerable danger of stranding that the landings are made. Many of the docks are greatly damaged, for when the water goes down and exposes the wood, which has been under water for a long time, the wood decays and an entire new foundation is required.

The old road, which led from the mainland to Washington Island, where formerly the village of Clayton was situated when it was known as French Creek, at the mouth of that stream, is now almost level with the surface, although it has been submerged for years.

If this condition of the water continues until next season, it will be necessary for the excursion boats to take an almost entirely new route.

### Movements of Vessels.

The steamer Geronia passed down, with a cargo of apples.

The steamer Seguin passed up and the steamer Haddington down.

The schooner Keewatin is at Howe Island loading hay for Belleville.

The barge Marengo arrived from Erie, with coal for the waterworks wharf.

The steambarge John Randall is loading coal at Crawford's wharf, for Seeley's Bay.

The steamer Midland Queen arrived from Fort William, with grain for Richardson's elevator.

The steamer Algonquin is on her way from Fort William, with grain for Richardson's elevator.

The steamer Buena Vista arrived from Smith's Falls to-day, and will clear for that port on Wednesday.

M.T. Co's elevator: Steamer Rosemount cleared for Fort William, Aug Emerson cleared for Montreal with two grain barges and one coal barge, steamer Mapleton arrived, this afternoon, from Fort William, and discharged grain; steamer Beaverton, grain laden, from Fort William, is due to arrive to-night, to discharge.

The steamer Alexandria was in port, on Monday night, on her way to Montreal, but owing to the fact that she had a big cargo on board, together with the fact that the water is very low, she was unable to load freight here for Gannanque. The fog was so heavy that the Alexandria had to remain at the dry dock for several hours.

At Swift's wharf: Steamer Aletha was forced to turn back, Monday afternoon, on account of the fog, and laid at the wharf until midnight, when she got away without any trouble; steamer Kenora stopped, this morning, and took on over 3,000 cases of canned goods for western points; steamer Belleville stopped, this morning, and coaled up on her western trip, and also discharged freight; steamer Rideau King is due from Rideau points to-night.

**Liquor Men Active.** The liquor men of Kingston, N. Y., have already started a campaign for license. They have distributed circulars in the form of blank ballots, at the head of which they inform the voter that he will ruin his business and increase his taxes unless he votes for license. They have also put up large posters to the same effect.

**Victorian Nurse Collections.** The annual collections for the support of the Victorian Order of Nursing in Kingston, has begun in the various wards by the ladies of the active committee, who assume the laborious task to support a most deserving charity.

This work, perhaps, not thoroughly understood by all who may be visited by the collectors, was originated by Lady Aberdeen to place relief and professional nursing within the reach of the poor, but there are cases in all classes where occasional aid from a professional nurse is a great need, such as dressing of injuries and other special treatment not requiring continual services of a nurse.

The fee received from persons able to pay, for such services is one of the great aids of supporting the work, for the large number of needy poor who are unable to pay anything. Assistance in the way of clothing, food and employment also frequently reaches those in need through this worthy channel and the entirely undenominational nature of the work makes its appeal deserving of general recognition.

**Tennis Winners.** The finals in the tennis tournament at the Century Club, were pulled off, on Monday afternoon, and much interest was manifested in the events. Maj. Sedgwick and Miss Bessie Smythe were the winners. Their competitors were Miss Nora Gordon and Prof. W. L. Grant.

**Contract Awarded.** The contract of heating the new Methodist Church at Odessa, was let to Thomas Bowker, of Harrowsmith, on Monday.

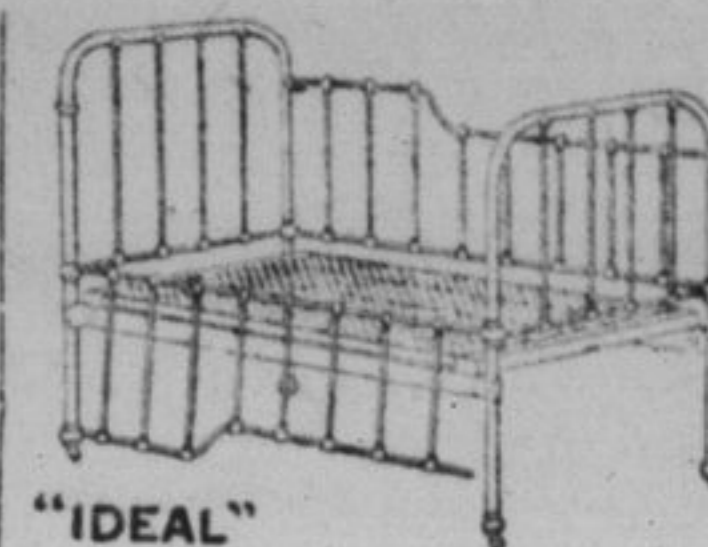

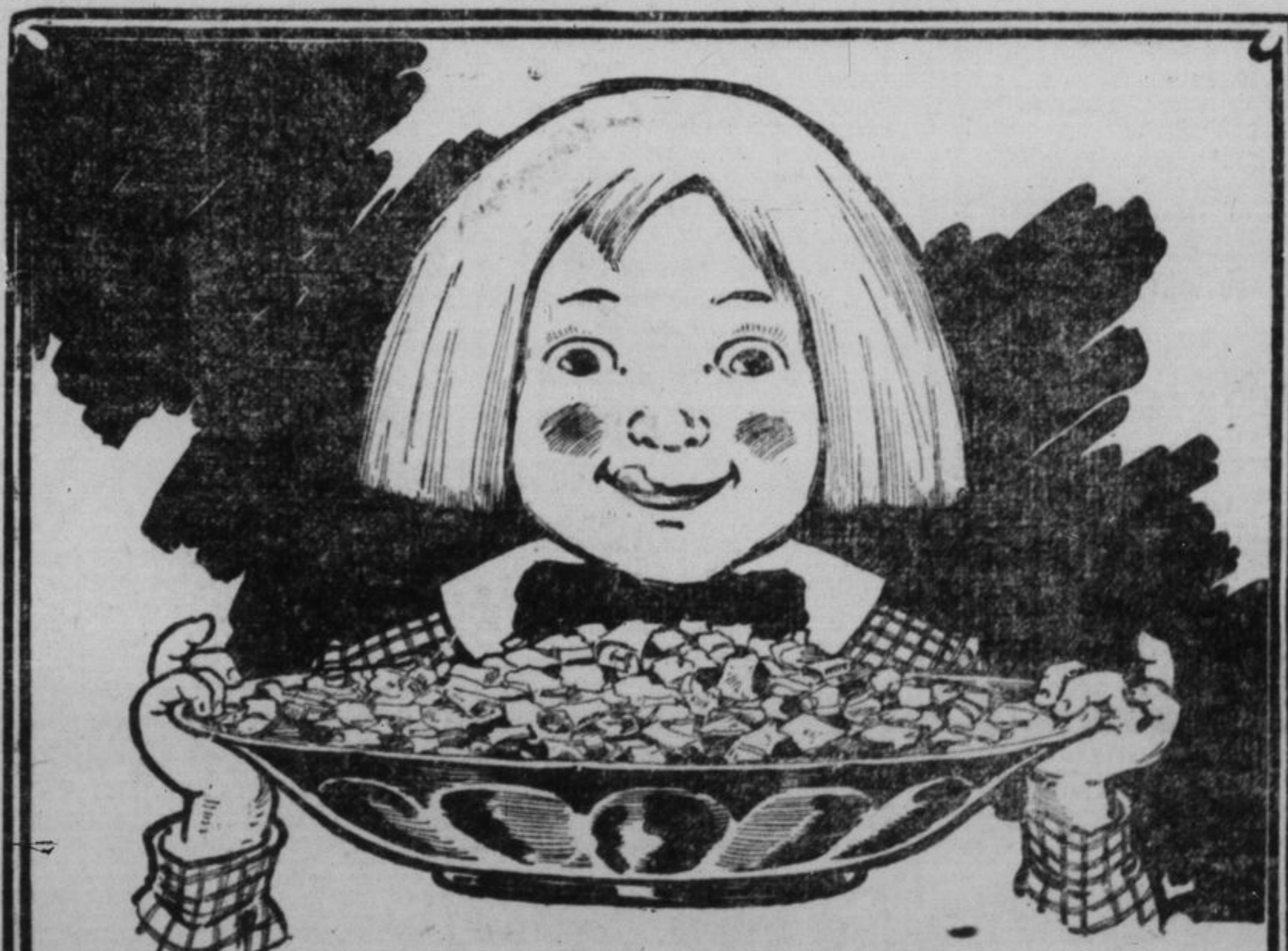
