The commission appointed by the Presbyterian general assembly to confer with Queen's University trustees with regard to the necessary legislation in connection with the changes in the constitution of the university, so as to make the institution undenominational, met here on Wednesday. The members are: Rev. Dr. Love, Quebec, convener; Rev. Dr. Armstrong, Ottawa; Rev. J. D. Byrnes, Toronto; Rev. James Cumberland, Stella; R. Lewis Peterson; Rev. James Wallace, Lindsay; Rev. Dr. Campbell, Montreal; Rev. Alexander Macdillivay, Toronto; G. M. Macdonnell, K.C., Prof. Robert Laird and D. G. Laidlaw, Kingston. The commission's duty is to see that the separation of the university from the church is in accordance with the plan submitted to the assembly by the trustees.

HON. WILLIAM HARTY RESIGNS

As Chairman of School of Mining Board of Governors.

TWO WEEKS IN JAIL

FOR YOUTH WHO STOLE A PAIR OF BOOTS.

Was Nabbed by Constable Arnel While He Was Wearing Stolen Footwear—Member of "Prohibited List" Sent to Jail—Street Loiterer Fined.

Edward Flaherty, scarcely out of his teens, and a former member of the battery, was found guilty of theft at the police court, on Wednesday morning, and sentenced to two weeks in jail. He stole a pair of boots, the property of a batteryman, named Young. The theft took place at the barracks on Saturday night. When arraigned before the magistrate, Flaherty pleaded guilty, but by way of excuse, said that he had been discharged at the barracks, for being absent from duty, and that some of his comrades took up a collection in his behalf. The sum of money collected had not been handed over to him, and for this reason he stole the pair of boots from Young, as the latter had been instrumental in getting the collection made for him.

The theft was reported to Constable Samuel Arnel, and the latter arrested Flaherty, and at the time the arrest was made the accused was wearing the stolen boots.

Young said that a collection had been taken up for Flaherty, and that the money was now in the hands of one of the men at the barracks, and could be obtained by Flaherty. The latter had been told that he could get the money now, or wait until the men were paid, when it was possible that he would be given more money. Flaherty had decided to wait. Flaherty did not think the money would be given him, and it was for this reason that he had taken the boots.

The magistrate, in imposing a sentence of two weeks, stated that this was a very poor way for the accused to treat the men who were trying to benefit him in his time of trouble. Because he refused to tell the magistrate where he had secured his liquor, Magistrate Farrell imposed a sentence of one month in jail upon Thomas Brick, who is a member of the "prohibited list." The accused said he was in a trance, and did not know anything that happened. The accused said that he would have made all the trouble for him, but the magistrate remarked that he was not at all satisfied with the story, and he would therefore take advantage of the law, provided, and impose a sentence of one month in jail, for refusing to tell where the liquor was secured.

A lad was fined 85 cents, for loitering on the street. The police are following up the "move on" crusade, and if any of the young men or boys think it is all a joke, and that they will not be summoned, they had better take warning. Loitering on the street must be stopped.

One drunk was in the lineup. He hailed from the old country, and has been employed on the steamer Strathcona. He was given a chance to leave the city.
