PLACATING THE FARMER.

The Montreal Star, during the election, opposed reciprocity with a feeling that could not be more intense and insistent. The Star was not willing that the farmers, through a trade agreement, should buy from, and sell to, the people of the United States at the seasons and the circumstances warranted.

It is now willing that the farmers should have farm implements and machinery at lower cost. This favour can be secured by placing agricultural implements on the free list, and the Star wants this concession made to the farmers without reference to any tariff commission which may be appointed and report upon the subject.

MEN FOR BOYS' CLASSES

The women of Canada are more modest than the women of America, (or that part of America which is called the United States), and of the women of England. In the old land nothing will do the militants but equal rights in everything. In America the suffrage movement halts while the woman, in commercial and professional callings, ask for equal compensation with the men.

The teachers of New York have about convinced the trustees that they can do as much work as the men, and that they can do it quite as well. This being conceded the question follows, Why should there be any discrimination in favour of the men?

TALENT ASSERTS ITSELF.

At the Board of Works meeting on Thursday afternoon the question of appointing an engineer was discussed, and it is understood that the committee will make a recommendation for the council which meets on Monday next.

There has been so much said about a qualified engineer that it is well to understand clearly and distinctly, what it means. There is no test which a candidate has to pass. The city is that there is not. The annual report of the Society of Civil Engineers is in itself a revelation. HOW THE MERGER WORKS.

Something may come out of this cornering of the market by the canners. They were not happy—the canners who constitute the merger—until they had acquired the property of all the men who were in a position to offer effective competition. They were forced into this position, reluctantly yet surely. The syndicate tried to dictate prices, and failed. The original canvass of the city for orders was without result. There were the independent canners, who could cut rates and do business, all of it that they could attend to. The lesson was obvious. There had to be control before there could be manipulation.

The merger followed. It was expensive, but it was complete. Like the park merger, which is now under way, it could have been announced that there would be consolidation, be lower expenses, and perhaps lower prices, though there does not appear to be any assurance of this. For a time the supply was maintained. Later the demand appeared to be greater than the supply. Still later there is no attempt to meet the requirements of the trade, and for the simple reason that the merger has determined to handle less for the former profit, and it can do as it likes while the monopoly lasts.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Mr. King, the former minister of labour, and the one who had a special training for the position, is not a candidate for the local house. The Toronto Tory paper which had him a candidate for the local house was a little previous.

The federal government will be asked to pass, at the next session, a marriage law, and one which will have a right-of-way over all other law and all church decrees. Nor can the petitions of the people for this law be shelved or laid aside. They must be acted upon.

There should not be any bilingual schools in Ontario. English is the language of the country. The teaching of French should be conducted privately, or at the expense of the individual, like the teaching of German, or Latin or Hebrew.

Sir James Whitney must feel humiliated because of the incompetency of the railway board. His judgments are being attacked by members of the legislature and supporters of the government. Mr. McNaught's repudiation is very severe.

FAREWELL AT MISSISSIPPI.

Isaac Allen and Family are Leaving the Village.

Isaac Allen, for many years one of the best-known residents of Mississippi, is leaving, on Thursday noon, with his wife and family, for Vancouver, B.C., where they will spend the winter. They are leaving Mississipi but have not yet decided as to where they will locate permanently.

On Monday evening Mr. Allen tendered a farewell banquet to his friends, in Minto Hall, at Mississippi, and the affair was attended by three hundred and fifty people, gathered from different sections of the countryside and from outside places as well for the friends of Mr. Allen and his family are legion. A fine spread was provided and after full justice had been done to the good things provided there was a musical programme and addresses. Rev. Mr. McMillen ably carried out the duties of chairman.
