PIANO PERFORMANCE QUEEN'S CONVOCATION

OF MARK HAMBURG IN THE CITY HALL LAST EVENING.

Was Heard by a Large Audience, Which Was Delighted With the Brilliant Playing of This Artist.

Most attractive counter attractions failed to lure the city's music lovers, and so on Wednesday evening there was a splendid audience to greet Mark Hamburg, who plays the piano with such human and sympathetic touch and interpretation that even those who despise it as "an instrument of music" are entranced. For two hours this man played almost constantly, and at the end there was only a hunger for more on the part of the audience.

The charm of Mark Hamburg is his simplicity. He is the Marchese of the keys, listening with pleasure to his own perfectly struck notes and helping, by the play of expression on his mobile face, his audience to appreciate the beauties of the music he brings forth. Last night he juggled with his programme a bit, and so different is his interpretation of the masters that the unlearned were sometimes puzzled for a moment as to just what number he was playing.

It was a varied programme, each distinct number preluded by a preliminary center over the keys to banish the theme of the previous one and to prepare for the next and give programme a chance to cause rustling and laid quietly down. Serene and rollicking sweet and low and tender, and then again thunderous, but always full of a beautiful tunefulness, a singing in the keys, Mark Hamburg's playing has the power to make stronger, gentler men and women. Rapturous applause greeted him as time and again he touched the heart, and his pleasure was evident when he returned to bow his thanks.

From the romantic chord of the great master, Beethoven, through Schumann's singing music, and on to several Chopin numbers, which he augmented by a Ballade of that composer, the music-master led the hall full of spell-bound, eager people to a couple of bits of modern music, and then to Mendelssohn and Liszt. The whirl of the "Spinning Song" and the crash of the second "Rhapsodie" had left the audience tingling, and they insisted on the player's return. At last he came, again the little excursions of preparation over the keys, and presently he was saying "Good-night" in the soothing tones of the Chopin Berceuse, and after the soft notes died away, men and women filled with dream music singing all around.

Oscar Telgman, who brought Hamburg here, has once more laid the city under an obligation to him, and it is being repaid in grateful thoughts if not in grateful thanks.

Held in Grant Hall on Wednesday Evening.

Prof. A. John Matheson and A. S. Ferguson Were Installed—An Address Given by Hon. Dr. Pyne.

Convocation at Queen's University Wednesday evening, in Grant hall, was a fitting close to the ceremonies in connection with the university during the day. Quite a large number of students occupied the galleries, the ladies on the one side and the men on the other. The platform was occupied by trustees, senators, members of city council and board of education, and others. Chancellor Sir Sanford Fleming presided and installed two new professors.

Principal Gordon said there were a number of changes in the faculties. Prof. S. W. Hyde had removed to the far west, and his place had been filled by Prof. A. S. Ferguson. A little later Dean Dupuis had thought it advisable to vacate his chair, and he had been succeeded by Prof. John Matheson. The principal called upon Dr. Goodwin to announce changes in the School of Mining. Prof. Goodwin spoke of the changes which had been made in that faculty, and also mentioned a number of promotions. Dean Connell spoke of the vacating of the post of anatomy professor by Dr. Etherington, who was succeeded by Dr. Kidd, a recent graduate of Queen's. He touched on the very important service Dr. Etherington had rendered during the past seven years.

When Prof. Matheson arose to be installed by Chancellor Fleming, he received a great ovation. He said he felt deeply the honor conferred upon him by the trustees of the university, and hoped he would be able to be of some service to it. He had looked upon the university first with awe, then respect and lastly love. He felt that his position was made much easier by his predecessor, Prof. Dupuis, who had placed mathematics on a sound basis. He considered himself very fortunate in working with a man of such a master-mind and with whom he had been an associate on the staff. Prof. Dupuis had been more than a father to him. His work had been made comparatively easy by Prof. Dupuis, and it would take all the energy he possessed to keep the pace set by the venerable retiring professor. Mathematics, he considered, was the most unpopular of all subjects. Many considered it very dry, but he believed that the subject was just what the professor or student made it. In concluding he said that in the next few years he hoped the faculty would measure up in some degree to the standard set and observed by Prof. Dupuis.

Prof. Ferguson was then installed by Chancellor Fleming, to the chair of mental philosophy. He thanked the board of trustees for the honor, and responsibility which had been conferred on him. He referred to the excellent work done by Dr. Hyde, who had preceded him, and said it was known from one ocean to the other. His address was masterful and was the result of profound thinking, showing him to be a man capable of filling the position to which he had been appointed. His reasoning was logical and to the point.

Principal Gordon then called upon Hon. Dr. Pyne, minister of education, to speak a few words. Dr. Pyne congratulated the university upon its success and the quality and number of graduates which were being turned out each year. A university, he pointed out, could not attain success without a foundation. This foundation usually was great teachers, and he had no doubt but that was the case with Queen's. In order to maintain the best staff of teachers, it was necessary to pay the teachers larger salaries.

Speaking of university life, he presumed universities of other lands had been copied a great deal. Britain, with its universities of culture, and the German institutions had been an example for research work. People did not realize fully enough the necessity of the very best education to develop the resources. He was glad to have had the chance to visit Kingston and see university life, and he assured the people when he went back to Toronto he would be the bearer of a cheerful message to Sir James Whitney and members of the cabinet.

GRAND OPERA HOUSE

IMPERIAL RUSSIAN BALLET CHARMED THE AUDIENCE.

A Rare Ocular Opera Entertainment Was Given—Francis Wilson in "The Bachelor's Baby" This Evening.

Kingston was privileged last evening to witness a performance by the all-star Imperial Russian Ballet, which appeared at the Grand and gave delight to a large audience. Kingston is the smallest city in which the company appears, and Ottawa will have it for only one performance this evening, when their royal highnesses, the Duke and Duchess of Connaught will attend.

The Russian dance artists present a rare entertainment, known as ocular opera. As the great Mendelssohn could write songs without words, so these dancers visualize silently the whole range of human emotions. In the comedy, "Coppelia", in two acts, no words are spoken, for none are needed. The expressions and movements of the dancers told the story more plainly than words could. The splendid music of the Symphony orchestra was a treat in itself, but there were times when the orchestra was completely forgotten, the music being overshadowed by the dancing. The most delightful dancer was Mlle. Lydia Lopoukova, scarcely twenty years of age, and the darling of Paris and St. Petersburg. This is the first time the present company, for whom she is attached had to pay \$30,000 for her release from an injunction. Mlle. Lopoukova appeared several times and fairly carried the house by storm.

From the minute she came on the stage her all-pervading charm was apparent. She is small of frame, with the eagerly intense face of a child, taking a huge zest in her dancing. Woven in her very self are youth and lightness, both imparting an immeasurable charm and in addition that indescribable poetry of motion is an integral part of Mlle. Lopoukova. Clad in an exquisite white filmy costume that made her appear more like a spirit than a human being, she seemed to be absolutely without weight as she floated almost ethereally through space.

Mlle. Julia Sedova, Mlle. Pajitzkaia and M. Alex. Volinine were the other stars, and all received the plaudits of a most appreciative audience. The company will be through on this route again later in the winter.

In "The Bachelor's Baby."

To-night "The Bachelor's Baby," which is said to be the most human comedy-farce that the stage has seen in a very long time, is to be presented here by Francis Wilson. Mr. Wilson wrote "The Bachelor's Baby" for his own use. The comedy-farce is divided into three compact, swiftly moving acts. The play contains a lot of witty lines, which are at times deliciously-droll. The story of the comedy is that of a baby girl who is left in the guardianship of Thomas Beach (Francis Wilson), a single man about town, whose dislike of children is the jest and distress of his friends. This little niece, whose mother and father, Beach's brother, are both dead, comes to live in his New York home and succeeds in entirely changing the life and thoughts of the master of the house. There is also a very pretty love story that entangles itself with the child's part of the play, and the end is most satisfactory and pleasing. The company and production brought for presentation by Charles Frohman is the same as were with the comedian during the long run of the play in New York at the Criterion theatre.

Put on Mixed Train.

The Grand Trunk Pacific railway has inaugurated a mixed train service to be operated on the Regina branch between Melville and Regina. This train will run Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, leaving Melville at 10.35 a.m., and arriving at Regina at 7.35 p.m. Leaving Regina Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays at 7 a.m., arriving at Melville at 4 p.m., and will make stops at the intermediate stations.
