HORSE WAS POISONED.

Alexander Quinn, Farmer, Suffered Loss.

On Monday morning, a horse owned by Alexander Quinn, farmer, at Fernoy, dropped dead near the home of a neighbor, and according to the report given by doctors, the animal was given a dose of poison, consisting of arsenic and Paris green.

Dr. Auckland, of Newboro, conducted a post mortem, and he reported that it looked like a case of poisoning. The stomach of the horse was sent to Kingston for examination by Dr. G. W. Bell and Dr. T. A. Albertson, and they report that the horse had taken poison, consisting of a dose of arsenic and Paris green. Dr. W. T. Connell has been asked to make an examination, and report.

It was reported on the street that the owner of the horse is having an investigation made, and that in all likelihood a court case would follow.

LAD SERIOUSLY INJURED.

George Whisken Was Run Over by a Coal Cart.

George Whisken, aged twelve years, a son of Edward Whisken, 42 Collingwood street, had his right thigh crushed by being run over by a coal cart, at the corner of Queen and Sydenham streets.

He was walking beside the cart, going up hill, when he slipped, the shaft striking him and knocking him under the wheel, which passed over his body. He was taken to the general hospital, and it is not known whether the thigh will have to be amputated or not.

DEEMED ADVISABLE ASSAULTED HIS FATHER

TO FORM ORGANIZATION OF ASSOCIATED CHARITIES. JAMES DEVINE WAS BEFORE THE MAGISTRATE.

Committee Appointed to Communicate With Delegates for Another Meeting—The Resolutions Passed.

"In the opinion of this meeting, representing a large number of the institutions, societies and churches in this city, it is deemed advisable to form an organization of the nature of the Associated Charities, and that a committee, consisting of Robert Meek, convenor; Dean Bidwell, Miss Ronan, Mrs. Mowat, J. C. McConachie, and E. F. Trimble, secretary, be instructed to communicate with the various charities, churches and institutions giving indoor relief in the city, requesting them to send duly accredited delegates, such delegates to have authority to act for their respective organizations, to a meeting to be held in the Y.M.C.A. on Thursday evening, November 2nd, next."

This was the motion passed at the meeting held in the Y.M.C.A. building on Thursday evening, for the purpose of considering the advisability of forming a Charity Organization Society.

Mayor Graham occupied the chair. The meeting was quite representative, there being present workers from the Poor Relief, King's Daughters, Daughters of the Empire, St. Vincent de Paul, Y.M.C.A., Y.W.C.A., general hospital, House of Industry, Hotel Dieu, House of Providence, Influence Home, Orphans' Home, city council, besides ministers from many of the city churches.

Great interest was taken in the question, and several good speeches were made, setting forth the objects and methods of the Charity Organization Society.

Mr. McConachie explained the purpose for which the meeting was called, and gave a brief outline of the work such a society could accomplish. He maintained that apart from securing efficient charity, preventing overlapping and imposing an organization of the kind proposed would be a very useful piece of machinery for carrying on various kinds of work for the social betterment of the citizens of Kingston. Being representative of all the charities and churches, it should be able to influence the council, and in co-operation with the societies of other cities, to secure provincial legislation when needed.

Dean Bidwell spoke of his own experience in charity work in this city, and urged that an effort be made to secure the best co-operation of all the societies and institutions giving indoor relief. He insisted that there would be certain expenses if the work were to be well done, and that before any work was actually begun, a committee should be appointed to form some plan for financing the organization. An office would be absolutely necessary, and the maintenance of this provided for. There was much work to be done that was not being done, work that might be accomplished with the money already given in charity if we had our work better organized.

Mrs. Mowat spoke of the Poor Relief Society, and stated that the Associated Charities was a great benefit to them when it was in existence before, and the Poor Relief Society would be very glad if such an organization were formed again.

Frank Rodden, porter of the British-American hotel, injured recently when a Trunk engine at the foot of Johnson street, will try to recover damages from the railway company. The engine drove at the time was so badly injured that he has not been able to use him since. When the accident occurred he was driving up to the station from Swift's wharf, at seven o'clock in the evening, when the engine struck him.

Stricken With Paralysis. Mrs. N. J. Dingman, Ontario street, wife of the inspector of inland revenue, was stricken with paralysis on Thursday morning. Mr. Dingman was away at Madoc at the time, but a message reached him in the afternoon, and he hastened home, arriving here on the early morning train from the west. Mrs. E. Macdonald was with her mother at the time. Mr. Dingman is in a critical condition, with little hopes of recovery.

Was Found Guilty, and the Court Imposed a Fine of \$20 and Costs or Two Months—Young Man Fined for Immoderate Driving on Street.

A rather unusual case came before Magistrate Farrell, in police court, Friday morning, when a son was accused of assaulting his father, in a most brutal manner, and was found guilty. James Devine, in the police court many times, on various charges, was the person accused, and his father, James Devine, went into the box and told the magistrate how it all happened.

He stated that his son caught hold of him, threw him on the ground, and struck him in the eye. As a result of the attack four stitches were required to close the wound.

The son said he was very sorry, asked by the court, what he had to say about the matter. "Whiskey was to blame," he said. "I would not have acted in such a manner if I had been sober. I never did such a thing in my life before."

The magistrate did not take this as an excuse for his conduct, however, and imposed a fine of \$20 and costs, or two months in jail.

Christopher Sloan has been in jail a week, on remand, having pleaded guilty to stealing a suit of clothes from a companion, working in a camp at Collins Bay. The magistrate said that he had made enquiries about the accused, and had found that his previous record was good. He believed that the week he had spent in jail would be sufficient punishment, under the circumstances, but warned him to be careful in the future, and not take property of others even if he did not intend to steal it, as it would place him in a bad position.

Frederick Allen and Harold Muller were before the court, charged with immoderate driving on the street. Constables Filson and Dunway were the complainants. The court found the two guilty. Muller, who was driving, was fined \$5 and costs, and Allen, who was with him, was taxed \$3 and costs. The offence occurred on the morning of October 12th.
