**TO RECEIVE \$200,000
AS ITS SHARE OF QUEEN'S ENDOWMENT.**

Provision for the Presbyterian Theology Faculty in the University—To Receive a New Building.

The bill for the separation of Queen's university from the Presbyterian church, to come before the next session of the Dominion parliament, will provide for a settlement upon the theological faculty, of the sum of \$200,000 as its share of the endowment fund, and for a separate building, fuel, light and attendance. The general assembly commissioners hold out for the transfer of the old arts building, now occupied by the faculty of theology, but the trustees did not want to give so much as that. The trustees promise, however, to erect a building for theology within five years. In the meantime, or until the new building is erected, theology will continue to use the old arts building. One of the assembly commission insisted upon a clause being inserted that the building should be held in trust for the theology faculty until the new building is erected.

Some of the assembly commission seemed to be fearful that the time might come when theology would be ousted from Queen's altogether, and they wish to guard against any such likelihood. They want the theology faculty to be so well anchored on the Old Ontario Strand that its position cannot be shifted. As there is such a small number of theological students, the time might arrive when its annexation to Knox, of Toronto, might be seriously broached. The Queen's men in the general assembly do not want this, so they are endeavoring to make the position of the theology faculty forever secure. They refuse to accept mere "housing room" for the theology classes. Other departments have separate buildings, why not theology?

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over the World.

There are sixty cases of diphtheria in the Parkdale schools.
W. B. Rankin, of Halifax, aged fifty-seven years, died on Thursday.
At Brockville cheese board, on Thursday, 13 13-16c. was refused.
Short hair has been made the distinguishing mark of the Chinese revolutionists.
Some 500,000,000 cigarettes are consumed annually in Canada. These were manufactured by Canadian producers.
East Middlesex conservatives have decided that Hon. W. T. White cannot run there. He may get Dufferin opened.
A sanitarium for the treatment of tuberculosis is now assured for Waterloo county, and it will be located near Berlin.
Carroll C. Hele has been appointed secretary to Hon. W. R. Hearst, minister of lands, forests and mines, at a salary of \$1,500.
Thomas Parker, a farmer, living near Embro, was run over by a steam-roller on Wednesday and is in a critical condition.
Mr. Beebe, Sydney, N.S.W., the minister for lands, promises to throw open a million acres on a leasehold tenure next year.
It is announced that the city site of Port Mann, the C.N.R. terminal on the Pacific coast, will be shortly placed on the market.
At Peterboro, Ont., Thomas P. Fitzgerald, aged seventy-eight years, and for twenty-four years deputy reeve of Smith township, died, after a long illness.

The temperance forces in the Rainy river district are inaugurating an active campaign to banish the bar rooms from that part of Northern Ontario.
The mounted police will establish a motor boat patrol on the Mackenzie river. Twenty-one foot boats are being obtained to patrol the river for hundreds of miles.
Twelve commercial travellers, from Germany, were registered at the Windsor Hotel, Montreal, all in Canada looking to a furtherance of trade with the fatherland.
It is understood here that Hon. Sidney Fisher will resign the post office portfolio and that G. H. Bovin, member-elect in Shefford, will resign to make way for his return.
The last rail on the C. P. R.'s new grain route from Victoria Harbor to Methuen has been laid. As soon as the ballasting has been completed the line will be ready for traffic.

At the appointment of Father A. B. Roy, as rector of the University of Ottawa, in succession to Rev. Father William Murphy, whose term has expired, is officially announced.
Howard L. Christie, aged fourteen, was accidentally shot in the head by Thomas Wade, aged nine. The boys were out gunning in New Brunswick. The boy died twenty minutes later.

Hon. A. G. MacKay denies very emphatically the statement that he has resigned the position he has held for some years as leader of the liberal opposition in the Ontario legislature.

The date for the Nova Scotia by-elections has been fixed for November 15th. Nomination day will be November 8th. There will be three elections—Lunenburg, Annapolis and Digby counties.

A petition was filed against the return of the conservative, David Marshall, of East Elgin. The usual charges of bribery, treating, personation, undue influence and other corrupt practices were made.
The Nobel prize in medicine has been awarded to Prof. Alvar Gullstrand, of the faculty of medicine of Uppsala University, Uppsala, Sweden, for research work in dioptrics in connection with his study of the eye.

James Pattens, brakeman on a Grand Trunk train, lost both legs by being run over at Guelph junction. This is the third accident that has occurred at this place within a short time.
The first Sweden chamber dissolved, and writs for a new election issued, in accordance with the promise made to K. Staff, the liberal leader, when he accepted the promise two weeks ago.

W. B. Scott, an old Guelph boy, formerly a freight clerk of the G. T. R. at Guelph, has been appointed vice president and general manager of the Union Pacific, with headquarters at Omaha.

The Eastview separate school, Ottawa, has been closed, owing to a case of small-pox that broke out in one of the families that attend there. There are about seven cases of the disease in Eastview.

Mrs. Bruchon, of Montreal, and Mgr. Langevin, of Manitoba, are going to Quebec, to assist Mgr. Begin in the consecration of Mgr. Mathieu, C.M.G., Laval University, as Bishop of Regina, on November 5th.

Sir William Grey-Wilson, governor of the Bahamas, sailed on Premier Borden on Wednesday and talked over the annexation of the islands to Canada, but would not say how far the negotiations had proceeded.
Confident that a membership of several thousands may be rolled up, the Montreal Old Boys' Association was organized at Toronto, and decided upon annual trips to the home city. W. J. O'Grady is the first president.

Four young married men were blown to atoms at McCurtis & Harvey's high explosive factory, four miles from Rigaud, Que. The only sign of the victims' bodies found so far, are an arm, one finger and a hand.

**LIBERALS PREPARING
TO TRY AND OUST WHITNEY FROM POWER.**

Conservative Government of Ontario Has Failed to Get the Share of the Immigrants to Which This Province is Entitled.

Toronto, Oct. 20.—A caucus of the liberal parliamentary party in the Ontario legislature was held yesterday afternoon in the offices of the Ontario Reform Association. The caucus was attended by Hon. A. G. MacKay, the leader of the opposition, and the liberal candidates, who have already been nominated for the approaching general election in the province.
The general political situation in Ontario was freely discussed by the members of the caucus, and the unanimous conviction was expressed that the Whitney government had failed to measure up to the expectations of the people of Ontario.
The census returns just published coupled with the conspicuous inability of the administration to take advantage of its great opportunities in the north country, were cited as evidence of the necessity for a change of government at Toronto.
It was felt that the agricultural policy of the Whitney government, so far as old Ontario is concerned, and the colonization policy for the agriculture lands in New Ontario, are entirely inadequate.

The census returns show that the Whitney policy has not only not retained the natural increase in the rural population of old Ontario, but has absolutely failed to secure any part of the large immigration entering Canada for either new or old Ontario. So much so, that the rural population of the whole province has actually decreased during the regime of the present government.
Before adjournment, on the motion of Daniel Reed, M.P.P., for South Westport, and J. C. Elliott, M.P.P., for West Middlesex, the caucus unanimously passed a resolution of confidence in the leadership of Hon. Mr. MacKay.

**A SILLY CHORUS MAN
SUES FOR HEART BALM**

He Wants \$50,000 From Miss Helen Woodruff Smith For Rejecting Him.

New York, Oct. 20.—A breach of promise suit of unusual interest is at present attracting wide attention in New York. Russell Griswold is suing Helen Woodruff Smith for \$50,000 heart balm. Miss Smith is the daughter of the late James E. Smith, once president of the New York Stock Exchange. The plaintiff is a Broadway chorus man. Fervent letters written by Miss Smith to Griswold, and which were sealed with countless "eye kisses" were read to the jury.
