"To the glory of God. This peal of nine bells was erected by the congregation and friends of St. Andrew's church, Kingston, December, 1911, through the zeal and untiring efforts of N. T. Greenwood, precursor and choir master, 1882-1898. Oh, Come Let Us Worship."

The chiming will ring every quarter and half hour. The large bell will strike out the hour.
