HELD IN THE ORPHEUM HALL ON FRIDAY EVENING.

Fortieth Anniversary of the Canadian Artillery Observed—A History Given by Col. Benson—Fine Programme Rendered.

The smoker given by the officers and men of the R.C.H.A., in the Orpheum theatre, Friday evening, to celebrate the fortieth anniversary of the formation of the regiment, was one of the most successful ever held. The spacious hall over the theatre was an excellent place for such an event and it was filled by the jolly soldiers who enjoyed themselves to the limit.

One of the special features of the evening was a short history given by Col. Benson, O.C., the third division. The Canadian Artillery originated in October, 1871, for the purpose of taking over the artillery property and equipment when the imperial troops left Canada. The leave-taking really occurred at the Citadel in Quebec. The first officer in charge was the then Lieut. French, now major-general. At that time he was appointed by the home government to organize the corps. He only stayed a short time and was succeeded by Lieut. Sharp, who is now retired. The first Canadian to have command was Lieut. Col. Mozambert, who has passed away, and the first man to join the regiment was Trumpeter Jordan.

About the first service the regiment saw was during a bread riot in Quebec. The soldiers certainly had a hard time there, but succeeded in quieting the uprising.

The next time they saw service was in the rebellion of 1885. Both batteries were called out to service and responded. One of the sergeants in this company was Col. Steele, a non-commissioned officer, who now commands the Strathcona Horse. Col. French was also in the North-West Mounted Police. Quite a large number of the members of the batteries led the force to join the police and did good service. There were no roads then and the regiment had a hard time getting past Lake Superior.

Among those who were present in that campaign were Lieut.-Col. Ogilvie, Sergt. O'Grady and Sergt.-Inst. Slade.
