THE CHURCH SERVICES AN ARTILLERY EVENT

HELD IN THE ORPHEUM HALL ON FRIDAY EVENING.

Fortieth Anniversary of the Canadian Artillery Observed—A History Given by Col. Benson—Fine Programme Rendered.

The smoker given by the Officers and men of the R.C.A.A. in the Orpheum theatre, Friday evening, to celebrate the fortieth anniversary of the formation of the regiment, was one of the most successful ever held.

One of the special features of the evening was a short history given by Col. Benson, O.C., the third division. The Canadian Artillery originated in October, 1871, for the purpose of taking over the artillery property and equipment when the imperial troops left Canada.

About the first service the regiment saw was during a broad riot in Quebec. The soldiers certainly had a hard time there, but succeeded in quieting the uprising.

The next time they saw service was in the rebellion of 1885. Both batteries were called out to service and responded. One of the sergeants in this company was Col. Steele, a non-commissioned officer, who now commands the Strathcona Horse.

Without any flattery, Col. Benson said, the R.C.H.A. was one of the best regiments in the land, and he urged all the men to stick by it through thick and thin.

SURVEYING THE BOUNDARY.

J. D. Craig Tells of His Work in Alaska.

John D. Craig, chief of the Canadian boundary survey, and son of ex-Ald. W. G. Craig, of Kingston, has arrived at Vancouver, B.C., from Alaska. He says the past few months have been devoted to running a line along the 141st meridian from Mount St. Elias to the Arctic ocean. This line is the boundary between the northern parts of the United States and Canada. They started this year at the Arctic circle and ran the line to within thirty miles of the Arctic ocean. The work consists of cutting paths twenty feet wide through the dense timber, putting up bronze monuments at an average distance of three miles apart, and mapping the country. The expedition consisted of ninety men and 150 hired horses. Canadian surveyors composed about half of the joint party.

The survey of the boundary between the northern possessions of the United States and Canada is costing the two Governments jointly about \$2,000,000. The work has been going on for the past fourteen years, but will be completed probably next year. Work on the 141st meridian has been under way for the past five years. With the extension of the line from Davidson mountains, where it was left this year, to the Arctic ocean, the entire survey will have been completed. The Davidson mountains are about 8,000 feet high and are very rugged and inaccessible.
