**STOLE HORSE AND RIG**  
HERBERT JOHNSTON GIVEN TWO YEARS IN PEN.

Made Off With Property of His Employer, Joseph Wood, Barrielfield. But Was Soon Captured—Accused Served Part of Two-Year Sentence For Similar Offence.

Herbert Johnson, aged eighteen, was, on Saturday morning, sentenced by Magistrate Farrell, to two years in the penitentiary for stealing a horse and rig, the property of Joseph Wood, of Barrielfield, by whom he was employed. Johnson served part of a two-year term for a similar offence, having been allowed out on ticket-of-leave.

Friday night Johnson made off with a grey mare and rig, the property of his employer, but it was not long before he was taken in charge. Mr. Wood notified the police, and at 2.20 o'clock Saturday morning Police Constable McAdoo noticed Johnson driving on Queen street with the stolen outfit and placed him under arrest.

Johnson pleaded guilty when arraigned before the court, but made no statement. The magistrate had a record before him to show that the accused had been allowed out on ticket-of-leave for horse stealing.

**Saturday Market Prices.**  
The market on Saturday morning was a very good size. A large number of the islanders were over. The price of pork took somewhat of a drop, selling at eight and ten cents. Some people were asking as high as thirty-five cents for eggs. Potatoes sold in some places from \$1.15 to \$1.25 a bag. The farmers are rushing in all the potatoes they have so they will sell them before the merchants bring them in from outside places, as they have already started to do. Creamery butter was selling at thirty to thirty-two cents a pound.

The London and North-Western railway, in conjunction with the Great Central railway, is experimenting with electric locomotives generating their own power. Designs for three of these engines are being prepared.

The Duke and Duchess of Connaught plan to make a tour of all the principal cities of Canada, but as yet no details have been considered. His royal highness' first outside trips will be to Montreal and Toronto. Other cities will be visited later.
