Admits Placing Poison. Newark, N.J., Oct. 21.—The police commenced an investigation today into the death of Mrs. Alva McArthur, wife of the advertising manager of an Amper, G.J., Electrical company, who was found dead yesterday, from cyanide of potassium poisoning. The woman had taken the poison out of a bottle in which she usually kept headache medicine. Her husband admitted having substituted the cyanide for the medicine, but insisted that his wife was aware of the substitution.

Beggar Leaves \$50,000 to Sister. San Francisco, Oct. 21.—Michael Sullivan, who has begged on the streets of San Francisco for thirty-five years, was found dead in his hotel here today. Bank books found in a mattress showed deposits of more than \$50,000. Sullivan's death was apparently due to natural causes. He left a will in which he bequeathed \$50,000 to his sister, Mary A. Sullivan, of Utica, N.Y.

BORDEN'S FAMILY TREE.

Member of Famous Kentish House Near Maidstone. London, Eng., Oct. 21.—Canada's general election caused the antecedents of the leaders to be inquired into here, and a writer in the Sport-ing Times points out that Mr. Borden is a member of a famous Kentish family, which has for centuries been associated with the parishes of Headcorn and Borden, near Maidstone. The present head of the family is an octogenarian miller living in Headcorn. "Men of Kent" are free-born, it is interesting to note, and are not amenable to some of the English laws, such as that affecting apprentices, for instance, a not inconsiderable favor at the time it was granted by an early English king as an appreciation of the loyalty of the yeoman of Kent.

SLAVE HORRORS IN TRIPOLI.

Returned Missionary Says Arab Trade Still Flourishes. Rome, Oct. 21.—The missionary Father Apollonio, head of the home at Benghazi, Tripoli, for young negroes who have been freed from slavery, says that the slave-trade in the north of Africa is flourishing. Small children are packed two, and even three, in a bag for transportation while the larger ones are tied in chains, the desert being stained with their blood. Those who collapse are abandoned to die of starvation or to be the prey of lions. On one occasion, the missionary says, the leader of the caravan, enraged because a female slave exhausted, was unable to proceed further, the member subsequently as a weapon with which to beat others of the unhappy party.

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BAIRS CARD PARTY PRIZES.

An Elizabeth, N.J., Official Issues Prohibition Order. Elizabeth, N.J., Oct. 21.—Men and women prominent in Elizabeth society were much exercised, yesterday, over orders issued by Prosecutor O. Addison Swift prohibiting bridge whist and euchre parties for prizes in that city. Prosecutor Swift was directed by the Union county grand jury, now in session, to put a stop to this form of entertainment. A large prize euchre party was held by the Young Men's (Athletic League of St. Patrick's church, but, under orders from the police, the awarding of prizes was ekminated.

GOODWIN LAMENTS GIFT.

Actor Seeks to Set Aside Deed to \$200,000. Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 21.—Nat Goodwin could not get personal service on his erstwhile wife, Edna Goodrich Goodwin, now the Baroness Keane, and had to have the summons published to have set aside a deed of trust in which he conveyed nearly \$200,000 to T. H. Dudley, in trust for his wife. Mr. Goodwin alleges that the deed was made on Miss Goodrich's promise of marriage, and that at that time he was the husband of Maxine Elliott, and for that reason the transaction was illegal.

THE LOSELL ROMANCE.

Crown Princess of Saxony and Eurico Loselli Reconciled. Florence, Italy, Oct. 21.—The former Crown Princess Louise, of Saxony, has arrived here and is occupying a villa with her husband, the pianist, Eurico Loselli. The couple had been living apart for a considerable time, and reports were current that divorce proceedings had been instituted. Now they are appearing in public, arm in arm.

Mrs. Jeffries Leaves \$99,500.

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 21.—An estate valued at \$99,500, will be distributed in equal shares among ten heirs of Mrs. Rebecca Jeffries, who died on September 5th, and whose will was filed for probate, yesterday. Among the residuary legatees is James J. Jeffries, former world's champion pugilist and son of the dead woman, who is made a beneficiary with other children, in consideration that they care for and support their father in his declining years. A provision specifies that any attempt to break the will shall be rewarded with disinheritance.

Queen Alexandra Buys Villa.

Copenhagen, Oct. 21.—Queen Alexandra has purchased for \$7,500 a small villa facing Hvidovre. When the structure is pulled down next year, the glorious view from the Villa Hvidovre will be considerably enhanced. Hvidovre is the joint property of Queen Alexandra and her sister, the dowager empress of Russia. It stands about five miles from Copenhagen, and was purchased by them in 1906.
