A MINIATURE CYCLONE THE OFFICERS CHOSEN

SWEPT OVER THE CITY FOR HOURS MONDAY EVENING.

Wind Blew About Seventy Miles an Hour—Scores of Windows Broken—Verandah in Portsmouth Torn Away.

Kingston was wrapped in the folds of a miniature cyclone, Monday evening, at intervals from shortly before nine o'clock until about midnight, and as a result there was a partial re-arrangement of things on Mother Earth when dawn broke Tuesday morning. Such a high wind, which it is estimated travelled between sixty and eighty miles an hour, has not visited this vicinity in years, and householders who suffered through the ravages of the storm, do not want to go through another one for a while.

The storm came up very quickly. At eight o'clock the stars were shining and nothing to indicate a storm was apparent. About a quarter of nine o'clock, a distant rumbling could be heard in the distance, which gradually increased until the wind burst upon the city with a scream. Houses shook on their foundations and people in the putlying districts were scared out of their wits. The wind could be heard distinctly long before it arrived. It was accompanied by a driving rainstorm, which cut any parts which were exposed, and those who were unfortunate enough to be exposed to the storm suffered keenly.

After about ten minutes' duration the wind slackened for a short period, only to renew its attack with greater vigor. It continued in spells like this up till midnight, while the heavens were black with hurrying clouds. The amount of rain which fell was not great, but what did come travelled at a high rate of speed.

Portsmouth suffered heavily. A large verandah belonging to a resident on the main street, was blown away from the house and carried for a half block down the street. Windows were broken by the dozens from the small pane to plate glass ones. Skylights, too, suffered heavily, and doors which happened to be swinging were wrenched from their hinges. The leaves lying in the parks were gathered up in clouds and flung ruthlessly in windows, verandahs and doorways. Trees in the country were uprooted and fences were smashed to pieces.

So far no catastrophes on the lakes have been heard of, but no doubt the masters of vessels were warned by their barometers in time to seek a haven of refuge. Schooners lying at Garden Island had quite a lively time to keep their hawsers from parting, owing to the plunging of the boats as the waves lashed to a fury by the force of the storm flung themselves over the deck.

Caps and hats were blown off the heads of the wearers and were never found again, and many other articles of wearing apparel were torn and otherwise damaged. Telegraph and telephone wires were blown down also.

Had Wind Storm. Marine men say that last night's wind storm was, without doubt, the worst of the entire season. The wind blew a regular hurricane, and vessels were compelled to seek shelter. The steamer Algonquin, loaded with a cargo of grain, from Fort William, on her way to Richardson's elevator, stayed out at Four Mile Point for several hours, owing to the heavy gale, arriving at Richardson's elevator at seven o'clock on Tuesday morning.

Capt. Johnston reported the gale to be one of the worst he has experienced in some time. The Algonquin is discharging 44,000 bushels of oats and 43,000 bushels of wheat. The steamer John Randall went aground twice on Tuesday morning, just below Cataract bridge, but was pulled off on both occasions by the steamer Buena Vista, without damage. The heavy wind was responsible for her going aground, taking her out of her course. The John Randall cleared for Rideau ports.

The steamer Alexandria did not call at Folger's wharf last night, on her regular trip to Montreal, owing to the fact that she was already heavily laden with freight.

FOR THE KINGSTON HEALTH ASSOCIATION.

Organization Meeting Held at General Hospital—Transfer of Straubenzee Property Will be Secured.

On Monday afternoon, in the board room of the Kingston General Hospital, a meeting was held of the board of directors of the Kingston Health Association (The "Sir Oliver Mowat Memorial Hospital for the treatment of Tuberculosis.")

Letters of incorporation have been secured, constituting the first board of directors as follows: J. A. Minnes, W. F. Nickle, M.P., Dr. Garrett, Dr. R. K. Kilbourn, Dr. Edward Ryan, Dr. W. T. Connell, Dr. D. E. Mundell, Colin Macpherson, R. Meek, W. R. Givens, G. Y. Chown, Dr. William Gibson, Dr. A. P. Knight, J. B. McLeod, Hugh McBratney, J. G. Elliott, Mayor Graham, Dr. J. C. Connell, A. J. Macdonell, R. W. Robertson, H. A. Calvin, Col. H. R. Duff.

The following officers were elected: Dr. J. C. Connell, president; A. J. Macdonell, vice-president; J. A. Minnes, honorary secretary-treasurer; W. F. Nickle, M.P., solicitor; Miss E. A. Hunter, secretary-treasurer.

The contract for the purchase of the Straubenzee property was assumed by the board, and the solicitor was instructed to secure the transfer, and possession by November 1st. The report presented on the condition of the funds showed that over \$9,000 of the subscriptions have been transferred by consent of the subscribers.

The amount of \$105 has been returned at the request of the donors as follows: Dr. John Macgillivray, \$25; Mrs. Lechly, \$20; S. J. Kirk, \$20; James R. Lawlaw, \$5; Mrs. E. Knight, \$5.

The canvass of subscribers will be continued till all have been consulted. The grant of \$2,000 from the city, and \$4,000 from the provincial government will be satisfied in full.

The public will be satisfied to learn that the long-talked-of project for the treatment of tuberculosis, is now approaching completion and that actual work will soon be going on in such ideal surroundings.
