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GAMBLING IS RIFE

MAJOR MCGILLIVRAY DECLARES EVIL HAS BECOME MENACE.

Police Indifferent—No Effort Made to Stop Games Conducted by Professionals.

London, Ont., Oct. 24.—In a statement to the press of the city Major McGillivray, of the Salvation Army, states that gambling in London is growing at an alarming rate, and that the evil has become a real menace to society. Not only is gambling tolerated in many homes, but almost everyone bets on ball games, football matches, etc. Worse than this, however, the major declares, that there are in London several places where professional gambling makes their living out of easy marks and that the police are aware of what is going on, but make no move to stop it. "The non-liferer," said Major McGillivray, "do not even bother to have any sort of an occupation as a blind. They are professional gamblers, and they do not care who knows it, and the evil reached a stage where it should be suppressed."

Dr. Morse's Sudden Death.

Amherst, N.S., Oct. 24.—The citizens of Amherst were unexpectedly shocked, on Sunday evening, to learn of the sudden death of Dr. Charles James Morse, who expired suddenly from heart failure.

The deceased was the son of the late Hon. James Morse, for many years prior to confederation a member of the legislative council at Halifax. His great-grandfather was one of the original settlers of Cumberland, and was at one time the officer in command at Port Cumberland. He was born seventy-one years ago. He graduated from Edinburgh in 1862, and practised his profession in Montreal for some time, returning to Amherst in the early seventies, where he has since remained.

Honoris Causa.

The faculty of Trinity University, Toronto, has given Mrs. Jonathan Talbot's coronation ode a place "honoris causa," (literally for the sake of honor, or more freely for the sake of honoring it) in the Trinity University library. This is a distinction which has never been granted to any Canadian woman poet up to the present time, and which also has never been conferred on any poet-man or woman—who was not a graduate or undergraduate of that university. The work of illuminating the ode is being completed under the skilled hand of Mrs. Bertha Haddon, pen artist, and will in itself be a fine example of Canadian art.

COLORED MAN TRIED TO OUST CLERGYMAN

He Caused Something of a Sensation in a Rochester Methodist Church.

Rochester, N.Y., Oct. 24.—Clarence Smith, colored, who said that his home was in Ganansota, but claimed he had recently been visiting a friend in Grape Street, Syracuse, shocked the congregation of the First Methodist church, on Sunday, by insisting upon substituting himself for the pastor, Rev. Dr. Gardner S. Eldridge.

The congregation was amazed to see the man arise from his seat in the rear of the auditorium and start down the aisle. He walked through the sanctuary and began to mount the steps of the pulpit. Dr. Eldridge tried to stop the man but he forced his way into the pulpit. Several ushers seized him and he began to shout that he had a "few remarks to make." After a scuffle Smith was taken to the rear of the church and turned over to two policemen.

Smith came here Saturday night from Syracuse. He admitted that he was arrested several months ago in Onondaga for disturbing a religious meeting, and that he was committed to a Binghamton institution. He escaped from there six weeks ago. Smith said sacred music inspired him to preach, and that he wanted to tell the Methodists just where they were going.

When asked why he did not go to the colored church here he declared the Lord did not draw the color line. There was no color in religion, he said. The man is believed to be insane.

Rev. G. S. Eldridge was formerly pastor of Princess street Methodist church, in Kingston.

Reduction Not Favored.

Western professional hockey interests will not be governed by the National Hockey association, according to J. Patrick, of Vancouver, the coast league being entirely independent of the eastern association. It is the opinion of Mr. Patrick and others out there that the N.H.A. is endeavoring to revise the rules, reducing the number of players on a team from seven to six, more from a business standpoint than to improve the game. Further, they think the game would suffer because a few penalties would reduce the teams to ridiculous proportions.

Three Months' Savings Would Pay for Georgian Bay Canal.

Montreal, Oct. 24.—"We in England are afraid," said Sir Robert Perks, the English millionaire contractor, who has just returned to Montreal from Havana. "Of the too radical tendencies of the powers that be, and knowing that Canada is a country of boundless prairies immense timber domains, and splendid mineral deposits, the purse strings of John Bull are loosened and millions of British savings are poured into the country."

Canada, he said, had received no less a sum than thirty million pounds sterling last year.

Sir Robert Perks, referred to the savings of the English people which he estimated at £700,000 daily, which he thought was an enormous sum, amounting to £150,000,000 or \$750,000,000 a year. Sir Robert figured that British savings during these short months, would pay for the whole cost of the Georgian Bay canal.
