FOR HOTEL BY-LAW

BOARD OF TRADE ORGANIZED FOR CAMPAIGN.

Chairmen Were Selected for Various Wards at Special Meeting—Will Put Forth Every Effort to Get Vote Out on Election Day.

At a special meeting of the board of trade, held on Wednesday evening, the question of the carrying of the by-law, for the new hotel, was under consideration, and steps were taken to organize for the carrying of the same on the day of election. Chairmen for each ward were selected. Dr. Ryan, the president of the board, presided, and there was a good attendance of the members.

At the opening of the meeting, the president explained the reason for the calling of the meeting, and at the same time suggested that chairmen be selected for the various wards in the city, the men selected to have charge of all the work in the respective wards. He also stated that it would be necessary to form various other committees.

A general discussion followed on the by-law, and afterwards the following chairmen were selected:

Sydenham ward, J. A. Minnes; Ontario ward, Ald. Kent; St. Lawrence, R. J. Carson; Cataract ward, Dr. J. J. Hart; and N. C. Polson, Jr.; Frontenac ward, Dr. Ross; Rideau ward, Ald. Couper and Ald. Hoag; Victoria ward, Mayor Graham and Charles Livingston.

A press committee was appointed, consisting of Messrs. J. G. Elliott, W. R. Givens, and L. A. Guild.

It was decided to refer the question of expenses, in connection with the campaign to the council of the board of trade.

The secretary was instructed to write Dr. Black, president of the Kingston Automobile Club, inviting the members to use their automobiles on election day, for the good of the cause.

REED MILLER COMING.

Important Event in Musical Circles is Announced.

An event, which undoubtedly will be characterized as the greatest musical festival in the history of old Kingston, will take place in Grant hall on the evening of Wednesday, November 29th, when Reed Miller, the greatest concert and oratorio tenor in America, and his all-star quartette will appear. It is through pressure brought to bear by Mr. Miller's old teacher Francis Fisher Powers, that this great artist has been influenced to give Kingstonians the pleasure and privilege of hearing this brilliant company.

It will be remembered that Mr. and Mrs. Miller, while on a visit to Kingston during the summer, sang at a private recital in Convocation hall, the great throng which was unable to gain admission at that time will do well to make an early reservation of seats which will be on sale shortly as there will most surely be a capacity house at Grant hall on this occasion.

Dr. Sullivan, of Kingston, which will likely be declared vacant at the coming session, owing to his non-attendance."
