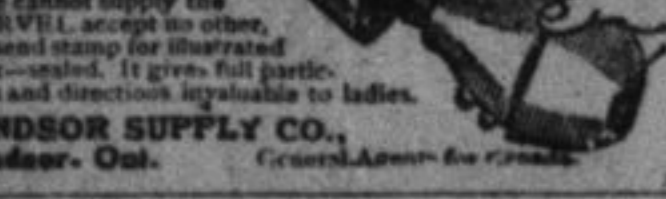

He was seen to fall by his son, found to be beyond help. Mr. Hogle, in his eighty-first year, was born in Sydney, and had lived in that neighborhood all his life. He was a Methodist and a life-long conservative.
