In the First Game of the Junior Intercollegiate Round - The Cadets in Fine Shape and Display Good Tactics.

The cadets now look as if they are going to clear everything up in the city with regard to intermediate and junior rugby. The junior team defeated Queen's III at the athletic grounds on Wednesday afternoon by 20 to 6.

In the third quarter Cadets scored two more points, making the score 13 to 4. In the last quarter, it was difficult to follow the ball, as it was getting dark. Cadets scored a touch and two rouses, while Queen's added two single points. With such a lead, the round is pretty safe with the cadets.

Cadets have a play where they pass the ball from one man to the other and it worked very effectively on their opponents. The seniors have also the same play and it is a dandy. The criss-cross was also worked, and proved good.

No settlement as to officials has yet been made and the college authorities have asked President Griffiths, of Toronto, to make the appointments. The college supporters are confident that the wearers of the garnet and grey can score another victory over Queen's and will go up to the limestone city, 400 strong, armed to the teeth.

Inter-Faculty Race To-day.

The interfaculty race at Queen's, scheduled to come off at five o'clock Thursday afternoon, promises to be a good thing, and the students are looking forward to as much fun this year as they had last. Over fifty were in the race last year, and it is expected that fully that number will be in again this year. Kerr, the fleet-footed arts man, won the race and arts scored the most points last year. A great many will be in costume to-day.

Although there are good men on the team, it is not expected that Queen's will be able to do much toward bringing championship honors back to the limestone city.

Ottawa is going to bring a rooters' club to Kingston for the game Saturday here. They have been thinking all along that they had the rooting business cornered, but they haven't. Queen's has organized a bunch of rooters, which will make the Ottawa bunch look like thirty cents. Reinforced by the band, the old Galtie war cry will be shouted as never before, and if Queen's does not win Saturday it will not be because of the rooters. With rival factions shouting for their respective teams, those who attend the Ottawa College-Queen's game, Saturday afternoon, should get their money's worth.

Road Race Postponed.

The Y.M.C.A. five-mile road race will have to be postponed to some later date than Saturday, on account of the fact that a number of Queen's men, who were intending to enter, will have to go to Montreal. A definite date has not been decided for the event.

No Double Header Saturday.

It was announced that there would be a double header rugby game at the university athletic field Saturday afternoon. This is not the case, however, as since that the R.M.C. authorities have decided that they would like to have a double header at the Military College campus. Accordingly the R.M.C. teams will play McGill I and Queen's III teams for the first positions in the junior and intermediate intercollegiate groups of this section.

Another Work-out Wednesday.

A number of members of Queen's I rugby team were out on the lower campus Wednesday afternoon. The whole team was not out, however, as the two strenuous practices of Tuesday afternoon forced some of them to take a rest. They should be in good shape for the game Saturday.

Officials Not Named Yet.

The names of the officials for Saturday's rugby game here have not been announced as yet. It is quite evident that what suits one manager does not suit another. Manager Marshall sent a list of Kingston officials mostly to the manager of the Ottawa College team, and he sent back a list of Ottawa and Montreal officials.

The Frontenac hockey team this winter will need to have two uniforms while on the road. On account of the new Arena artificial ice rink in Toronto to be heated, the boys will have to doff their heavy sweaters and padded pants and put on light jerseys and wear no underwear.

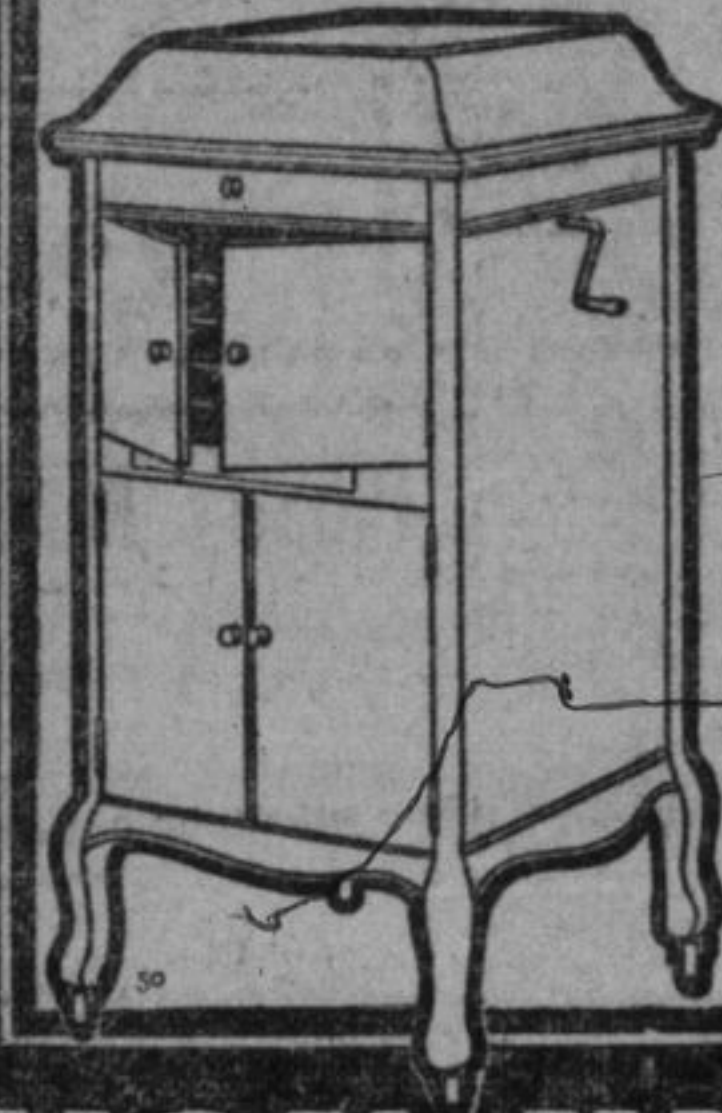
The stakes of the world's baseball series are the richest ever played for by two baseball teams. The players' participation in the receipts ended with Tuesday's game. They will split \$127,910.61, of which sixty per cent, or \$76,746.36 will go to the winning team and forty per cent, or \$51,164.25, to the losers. Twenty-one players on each team are eligible to participate in the money, so that the players on the winning team will each receive \$3,654.68, and the members of the losing team \$2,436.24 each.

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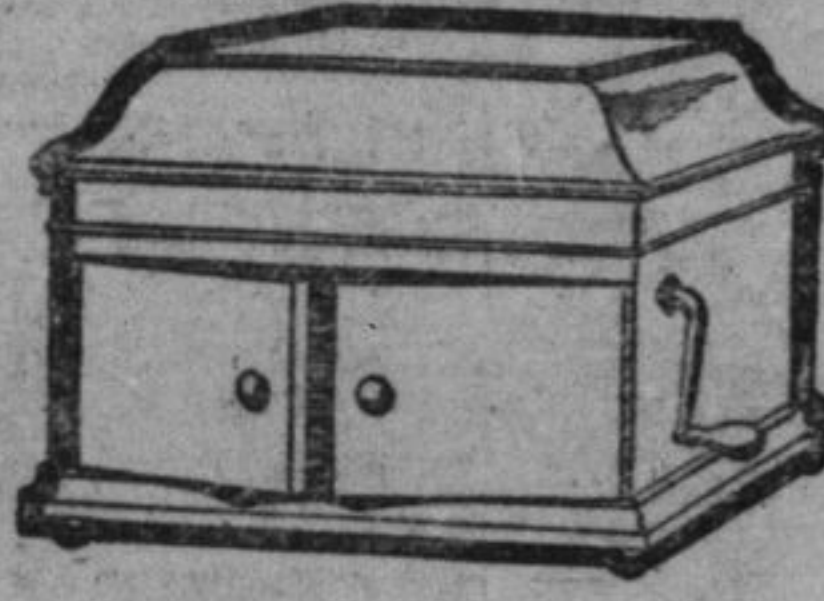
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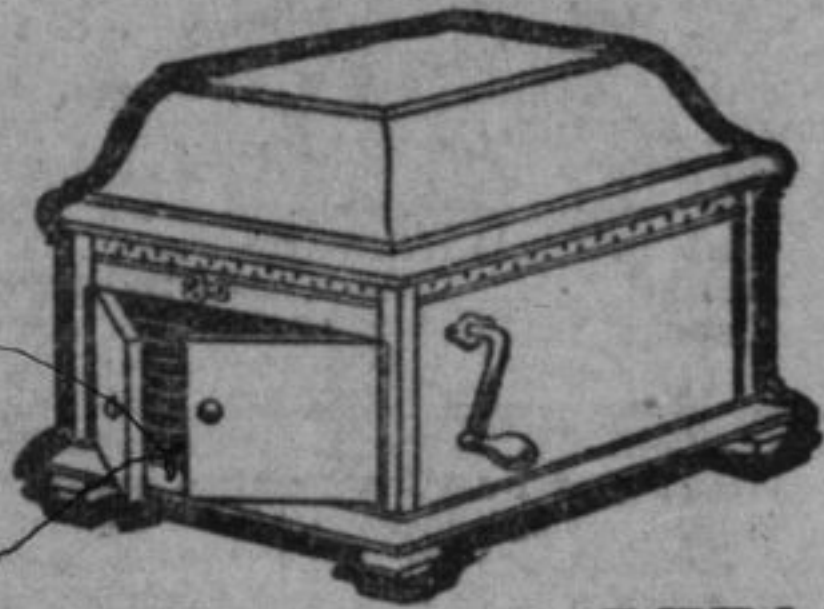
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
