**DOINGS AT DENBIGH.**

Two Pioneer Families Are Leaving the District.

Denbigh, Oct. 24.—Joseph Adams, of Kingston, is enjoying a visit here with his parents, Dr. and Mrs. Joseph Adams. Miss Genevieve Lang, of Toronto, has also arrived to have a visit with her father and relatives here. Messrs. J. S. Lane and Albert Lockwood have arrived home again from North Bay, where they have been engaged about six weeks building a dwelling house on one of the town lots purchased there by Mr. Lane. Messrs. O. Chanson, F. Stein and W. J. Slater were out to Napawan last week on business. Harvest thanksgiving service was held by Rev. J. Reble in the Lutheran Church here on Sunday before last and in Laglan last Sunday. Next Sunday he is to conduct divine service in Ladysmith. 'Joe' On his journey there he intends to stay a few days over in Ottawa and to pay a visit to Rev. F. Beer, and some other friends who now reside there.

Denbigh is going to lose a couple of its most respected pioneer families. Emil Warlich sold his farm and saw-mill to Dan Donovan, and bought a farm of nearly three hundred acres in Sebastopol township, on which he is now plowing, though he does not intend to move with his family away from here until the latter part of the winter. Joseph Youmans has rented a large farm near Tweed, on which he is now also doing some plowing, and intends to move with his family on it before next spring.

Several more of the young men intend to leave this week for New Ontario, to work in one of the lumber camps there during the winter, as work in this vicinity will be scarce, and most of the farmers are well ahead with their fall work.

**PITH OF THE NEWS.**

The Very Latest Culled From All Over the World.

The governor-general proposes to pay a short visit of two days to Montreal on December 14th.

Miss Dagenais, of Quyon, Que., has entered an action against Rev. Father Dagenais for \$5,000 for slander.

Canadian Pacific gross for week ending October 21st: 1910, \$6,532,920; 1911, \$7,292,000, increase, \$759,080.

Police Inspector Donald Macpherson has been appointed chief of Winnipeg police, to succeed Chief McRae. He joined the force in 1903.

Chili has re-purchased the British battleship Triumph and Swiftsure, and the papers suggest that another vessel of the Dreadnought type be built.

It now appears as if 3,000 men would have to be called before a jury can be chosen for the McNamara trial in Los Angeles. In one California case 3,100 were called.

At Brantford there are prospects for a three-cornered fight in the provincial contest, officers of the Trades and Labor Council announcing that a labor candidate would be put in the field. Lieut.-Col. H. R. Smith, C.M.G., sergeant-at-arms; Col. S. B. Steele, C.B.; Col. A. P. Sherwood, C.M.G., and Commander Roper, R.N., have been appointed honorary aides to the governor-general.

The Australian government is getting afraid of foreign liners that are easily converted into commerce destroyers, and proposes to take action to discourage such shipping from trading in Australian waters.

The Duke of Connaught has consented to become patron of the Dominion Rifle Association, an honorary office invariably held by the governor-general. The duke holds a similar position with respect to the National Rifle Association of Great Britain.

John E. Redmond, leader of the Irish parliamentary party, announces that the home rule bill is almost completed, and declares that in principle the details will prove satisfactory to the nationalists and will be the final settlement from both financial and political standpoints.

**KING'S COLLEGE FUND.**

Old University Aims to Raise the Sum of \$125,000.

Halifax, N.S., Oct. 25.—King's College, the oldest colonial university in the British empire of Windsor, N.S., is seeking to extend its usefulness. The extension movement is now in progress. The aim is to raise \$100,000 for additional endowment and \$25,000 for other needs during the present week. Last night the Alumni Association had a dinner at the Queen's hotel, at which Judge Forbes, president of the association, presided. Bishop Worrell, President Powell and others spoke. At the conclusion of the dinner it was announced that the first day's receipts amounted to \$15,000. The present canvass will cover Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. New Brunswick will be covered later. King's College is the Anglican theological school for the maritime provinces. It is located at Windsor and was founded in 1780.

**CHILI PREPARES FOR WAR.**

Buy Battleships and Sends Troops to Boundary.

Valparaiso, Chili, Oct. 25.—Replying to what is described here as the bellicose attitude of Peru, Chili, has repurchased the British battleships Triumph and Swift Sure, and the papers suggest that another vessel of the Dreadnought type be built.

The warships mentioned were originally intended for the Chilean navy, but were acquired by the British government in December, 1903, while they were still in the yards of their English builders.

Large contingents of troops are embarking for the northern frontier. The situation has resulted from the long-standing boundary dispute.
