CANON STARR'S ADDRESS AT A.Y.P.A. MEETING.

"An Educational Policy" the Subject—Social Problems Increasing.

"An educational policy for the A.Y.P.A." was the subject of a concise and interesting address, which Rev. Canon Starr, of Kingston, delivered at the afternoon session of the A.Y.P.A. Inter-Diocesan conference. Young people of today, declared the canon, are regrettably ignorant of religion, and are not joining the various churches as they should. There is a drift toward what is practical in life and religion, being viewed otherwise, is neglected.

The social problems of today are increasing, and becoming steadily more and more complicated. There is a strong need for a wise educational policy in the training of the youth of this country. An education is needed for development along lines of adaptability and usefulness in life. Life is essentially social, and no man can live to himself. Religious education implies education in the fullest sense of the word. The self-revelation of God to men through religion is gradually going on. The falling away of the young from the church is due to a failure of the church to recognize the needs of the young.

The inner life must come to outward expression in order to realize itself. A great educational work lies before the A.Y.P.A. It should be a co-operation, and consideration for the rights and opinions of others, a true self-government in the minds of the young. The educational aim of the A.Y.P.A. should be "For Christ and the Church."
