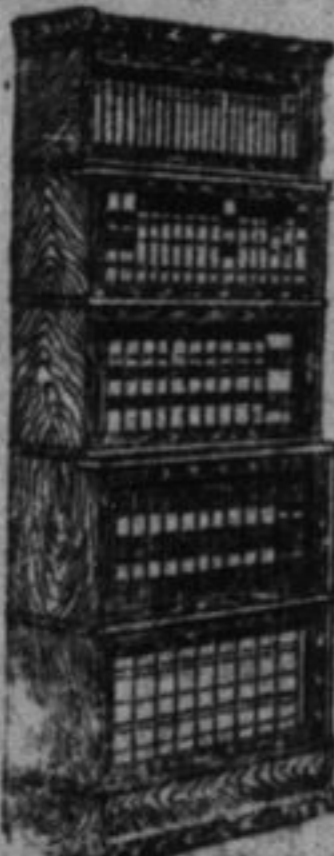

IN SPORTING CIRCLES

QUEEN'S INTER-FACULTY RACE WAS NOT HELD.

The City Basketball League May Not Materialize — Protests Against Sunday School Basketball League Rule.

The annual inter-faculty race was not run off at Queen's Thursday afternoon. The chief reason was the fact that so many other meetings were on that the students could not rally in sufficiently large numbers to make the race a success. It will probably be run off next week.

City League Basketball. From present indications it looks as though considerable difficulty would be experienced in getting a sufficiently large number of teams together this year to form the city basketball league. At the present time there are only two teams, Moore's Garage and Wholesalers, who are ready to enter the fray. Unless any other team can be secured there will be no league.

Vigorous Protests Made.

Vigorous protests are raised in Sunday school basketball circles as the result of the by-law passed to prevent city league players from participating in the series, and those who are barred have threatened to withdraw from the Sunday school league and start a league of their own. The outcome of the situation will be awaited with interest as those who were instrumental in having the motion passed have refused to rescind it.
