NEW RAILWAY BOARD

WILL DIVIDE COMMISSIONERS INTO EAST AND WEST SECTIONS.

The New Board will be located at Winnipeg, and will have to do with Problems in the West.
Ottawa, Oct. 27.—It is the intention of the government to divide the railway commission into two sections. One of these will have its headquarters beyond the great lakes, and will deal with matters which pertain wholly to the west. The eastern section will continue to be centred in Ottawa, and will deal with questions affecting the east.
When Mr. Borden toured the prairie provinces last summer he explained his policy fully in this connection, and he now intends to supplement the promise he then made. The rearrangement of the work of the board will be made very shortly, and it is very likely that the commission, as constituted at present, will continue to deal with eastern matters, a new board, with headquarters in Winnipeg, being created.

The name of C. A. McGrath, who was for some time mentioned for the chairmanship of the western board, Alexander Haggart, who resigned in order to permit the Hon. Robert Rogers to sit for Winnipeg, is also a likely member of the commission, as is M. S. McCarthy, the ex-member for Calgary.

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 26.—For the second successive year, Connie Mack's Athletics are baseball champions of the world. By winning this afternoon's game here with New York, they took fourth out of six of the contests played, and won out in all departments, their total of runs scored and hits made being away in excess of the Giants', and their errors being materially less. Philadelphia proved themselves the superior of the Giants in every way.
This afternoon's game was a walk-over for the Athletics, the score of the winners running up to the unlucky number of "thirteen," while the Giants could muster only two in the score column. Giants looked like winners in the first innings, but only in that, in the second Philadelphia tied the score, and afterwards swept ahead.

In the fourth the Athletics began to pound Ames, and four runs were scored. THE PLANS COMPLETE

FOR GREAT MISSIONARY MOVEMENT TO SWEEP CITIES

Both in Canada and the United States—To Seek to Get Christianity Out of Cold Storage.
New York, Oct. 27.—We are succeeding in getting Christianity out of cold storage; the Men and Religion Forward Movement is sweeping the country. Results so far have been highly satisfactory. This is the gist of a statement made by Henry Rood, publicity secretary of the Men and Religion Forward Movement, which was recently launched in Minneapolis and which will be carried through seventy-six cities in Canada and the United States between now and next May. According to Mr. Rood, who has just returned from the west, there is interest in the movement, as nearly as can be estimated, between five and six million men and boys; a larger number than have taken part in any other one effort of the kind since the crusades of the middle ages, with the single exception of the reformation.
Preparations for this continent-wide campaign have been under way since May, 1910, when there was created a national committee of ninety-seven, consisting of representative business men of all the Protestant communions from every section of the land. Under their encouragement, a local committee of one hundred men, who are looking out for nearly seventeen hundred auxiliary towns and villages. The object of the movement is twofold: To arouse the religious spirit among men and boys in the hope that they will bring it into a practical daily life, and, as Mr. Rood expresses it, "to get Christianity out of cold storage, putting it to work in the community for the betterment of conditions surrounding men and women and children."

TO DINE MR. LEONARD.
Resolution of Congratulation to New Chairman.

The chief text at the monthly dinner of the Royal Military College Ex-Cadet Club, of Montreal, at the Windsor, was the high preference achieved by ex-Cadet R. E. Leonard, C.E., in gaining the chairmanship of the National Transcontinental railway commission. No date was fixed for the Leonard dinner, but the new official will be asked to accept the complimentary dinner at the Windsor. "Knowing well that Mr. Leonard's occupancy of that high office will be beneficial to the country, creditable to himself, and honorable to his alma mater, the old Royal Military College, Kingston, we wish him every success in this, his further career of usefulness, in the development of our great and growing dominion."
