THE JURY ADDRESSED

BY COUNSEL IN THE McRAE MURDER CASE.

Lawyer for Defence Gave a Scathing Arraignment of Dr. Magee—Blackstock Asked for Justice.

Cornwall, Oct. 27.—The sessions of the court in this Melbae murder case today were occupied by addresses of counsel. Mr. Pringle for the defence delivered an impassioned address on behalf of the prisoner, arraiving Dr. Magee in scathing terms for harsh treatment of his wife.

"Who would think," said Mr. Pringle, "that an educated man would have beaten and ill-treated even a dumb animal as Dr. Magee did his wife?"

He told Crown Prosecutor Blackstock he could not stir the sympathies against the accused in the name of holy religion.

Mr. Blackstock replied with an eloquent address for justice for the death of William Shaw. He said that since religious questions had been introduced by the defence he must reluctantly tell the jury that Mrs. Magee had definitely declined to live with her husband until they had been married again by a Roman Catholic priest.

PRICES OF PERFUMES RISE.

Earthquake at Messina One of Causes of Increase. London, Oct. 27.—Many of the necessities of life have been rising in price recently, and the result has been trouble in various countries. But it is not only the necessities that are becoming most costly. The luxuries are also going up in price, and one of the greatest activities in ascending is, to women, almost a necessity.

The price of perfumes has been increasing in a most alarming way, and from present indications is likely to continue to increase. There are various causes for this state of affairs. For years the prices of the essential oils, out of which the costlier perfumes are made, have been steadily rising, and now for various local reasons several have again taken a big jump forward. For example, bergamot, a base of many perfumes and scented hair-washes, is now very costly, because of the Messina earthquake.

Long and Hard Winter?

Cene Vincent Eagle. Farmers in Ontario county are preparing for a hard and long winter because the red squirrels and chipmunks have become very busy laying in their winter food store, even going to the extent of collecting green chestnut burrs, breaking them open and hiding away for future use the unripe chestnuts. The natives declare they never before know the squirrels to open green chestnut burrs or to begin storing food so early in the fall.

Up Against Complications.

Pekin, Oct. 27.—General Li Yuan Hing, who has proclaimed himself president of the republic of China at Hankow, has run up against international complications in declaring he will collect the custom revenues at the ports controlled by his people. He has been notified that these revenues must be turned over to the British inspector general of customs, as security due the foreign nations, investors on the national debt.

Elected by Acclamation.

Ottawa, Oct. 27.—Eleven ministers of the Borden cabinet were, to-day, elected by acclamation in their respective constituencies, no opposition being put up in any case. It is understood that the other ministers, whose nominations come later, Messrs. Barrill, White and Cochrane, will also be unopposed.
