A SAD CASE REVEALED

DOMESTIC TROUBLE IN THE POLICE COURT.

Three Small Children Taken From Their Parents and Placed in St. Mary's Orphanage—Wife Asked for Separation From Her Husband.

A sad case of domestic trouble was revealed in police court, Wednesday morning. Thomas O'Gorman, living on Ontario street, was accused of assaulting his wife. After hearing the evidence, the magistrate dismissed the charge, being of the opinion that one was as much to blame as the other. The couple have three small children, one aged three, another six, and the third eight, and the magistrate ordered that they be placed in St. Mary's Orphanage, stating that they had not been properly looked after. The father expressed his willingness to pay for the children's keep.

Mrs. O'Gorman claimed that her husband threatened to take her life, and that after pulling her waist off her back, he kicked her. Her husband admitted pulling her waist when she aggravated him, but denied having kicked her. He pointed out to the magistrate, that the entire trouble was due to the fact that his wife and his fifteen-year-old daughter persisted in staying out late at nights. Just recently, they left him and went to Belleville. He wanted to have the daughter separated from the mother, and from what was said in court, it is likely that the girl will be placed in a position by J. C. McConachie, agent of the Children's Aid Society, who has been acting on the case.

Mrs. O'Gorman told the magistrate that she wanted to get a separation from her husband, and her husband appeared to be agreeable to this. She said that she would go out to service, and that she would also assist in the keep of her children. She did not care to have the children sent to St. Mary's Orphanage, but the magistrate said that this was for the father to decide, and he decided to have them go to St. Mary's.

RUN OVER BY ENGINE

GEORGE DIXON, HOTEL PORTER, SEVERELY INJURED.

His Right Foot Had to be Amputated—He Was Struck Down at the G.T.R. Junction.

George Dixon, a young man who has been employed around the city for some time, met with the misfortune of being run over by a light engine at the Grand Trunk junction on Wednesday morning at an early hour. He was seen around the station in the early part of the evening by a few young men from the city. The next seen of him was when he was discovered lying at the side of the tracks having been run over by a light engine that had been shunting in the yards. He had been seriously hurt, having his right foot and ankle so badly crushed that it had to be amputated. His face was also badly cut up.

Dr. W. G. Anglin and Corbett's ambulance were summoned and the injured man was removed to the general hospital, where his injuries were dressed for the time being. His foot was found to be so badly crushed that it had to be amputated on Wednesday morning.

TO SPEND REST OF HIS LIFE IN PRISON.

He Was Quite Downcast—Will Enter the Penitentiary Hospital, as He is Not in Good Health.

The noon train from the east brought two prisoners for the big prison at Portsmouth, accompanied by the deputy sheriff of Gengarry and the governor of the gaol. Patrick McRae, sentenced to life imprisonment at Cornwall, last Saturday, for murdering a woman, was one of the prisoners, and a young man named McGillivray, of Morrisburg, sentenced to three years for an attempted criminal offence, was the other.

McRae, who was dressed in a blue suit, is tall and stooped. He was in no mood for conversation, and, as he has been under medical care, will go into the hospital when he arrives at the prison. He was not handcuffed.

The prisoners had dinner at the canteen restaurant, from whence they were driven to the prison, one to finish his days and the other, in time, to be released and, it is hoped, start life anew.
