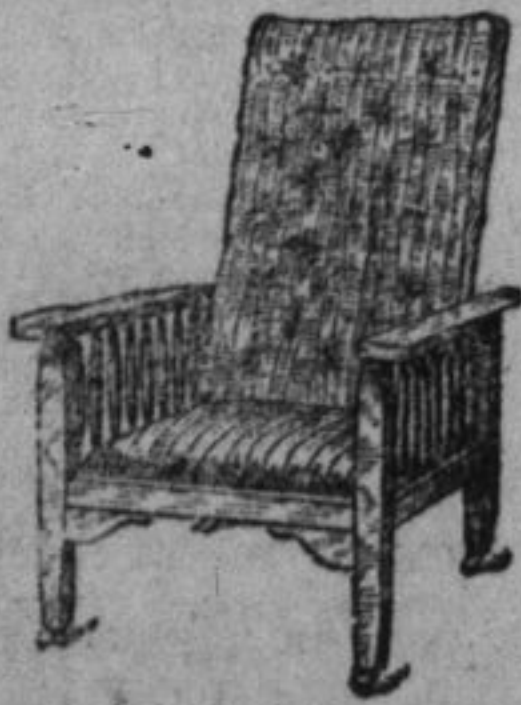

WANT HARBOR WIDENED

TO ACCOMMODATE BIG VESSELS AT CHARLOTTE.

Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Company Will Build Two New Vessels.—Notes of Marine Around the Harbor.

It is reported that unless the federal government sees fit to widen and dredge the Charlotte harbor it is probable that Rochester will lose the services of the lake boats, Kingston and Toronto. The Richelieu & Ontario Navigation Company will shortly erect two new boats, each forty feet longer than either the Toronto or the Kingston. As the width of the harbor is at present barely sufficient for these boats to turn, it will be impossible to bring these boats into the harbor and for this reason the Rochester Chamber of Commerce is putting forth every effort to have the harbor widened.

The steamer Newsboy was placed on the Cape Vincent route on Wednesday for a few days, while slight repairs are being made to the steamer Wanderer.

The steamer St. Joe, which discharged coal at Crawford's wharf, cleared on Thursday morning for Ogdensburg, N.Y., to undergo repairs.

The schooner Julia B. Merrill arrived from Oswego with coal for Anglin's.

The steamship John Randall arrived at Crawford's wharf with a cargo of brick from Seely's Bay.

M. T. Co.'s elevator: The steamer Kinnmont, from Fort William, discharged 70,000 bushels of wheat and cleared for Port William with oil barge No. 6 in tow, for Port Dalhousie; the barge Ungava lighted 15,000 bushels of corn off the steamer Donnacona, from Fort William, is lightening a cargo of wheat; the tug Bartlett arrived from Charlotte with two barges; the tug Clyde cleared for Montreal with two coal barges; the steamer Toller is due to arrive from Port Dalhousie this afternoon to lighter grain.

At Swift's wharf: Steamer Dundurn passed down Wednesday and left off freight; steamer Aletha cleared this morning for Rideau points; steamer Aletha was down from bay ports to-day.

The amount of freight moving on the river now is tremendous. The output of a large number of the canning factories between here and Toronto is being shipped eastward by boat. Large consignments of it are left off here to be shipped to inland points. Swift's wharf is so crowded that further freight coming down from the west is being held at points along the line of travel until the sheds can be cleared.

A telegram to Stanley Porter, of the local post office staff, Thursday afternoon, announced the death of James Marshall, of Toronto, formerly of Kingston, at noon. The deceased was stricken with apoplexy on Wednesday. He went for years in the employment of George Robertson & Sons, this city. A little over a year ago his son, Robert, the secretary of the Kingston Old Boys' Association, of Toronto, passed away suddenly. The funeral will be held in Toronto on Saturday.

Will Work for By-Law.

The members of the Kingston Automobile Club held a meeting at the board of trade rooms, on Wednesday morning, and decided to work for the passing of the hotel by-law. The members will hold a meeting with the ward chairman for the purpose of organizing to get out the vote.

Y.M.C.A. ROAD RACE TO COME OFF SATURDAY.

The annual five-mile road race for the Nash trophy, emblematic of the championship of the city, will be run off Saturday next, under the auspices of the Y.M.C.A. The race will begin at two o'clock and will be run over the usual course.
