HELP FOR THE NEEDY THE SPORT REVIEW

GOOD WORK DONE DURING THE PAST YEAR.
 Some Desirable Things Had to be Put Aside for This Year—The Proposal of the Children's Aid Society.

The annual meeting of the Home for Friendless Women and Children was held in the home, with a good attendance, on Wednesday afternoon, with Dr. A. E. Ross in the chair. The minutes of the last meeting were read by the secretary, Mrs. Hugh Macpherson, and adopted.

The report of the president, Mrs. W. H. Macnee, was most encouraging. During the year sixty-six children were cared for, an increase of twenty-three over last year, and several children have been placed in comfortable homes. At present fifteen infants and four adults are being cared for. It was found necessary to put a new roof on the building and this expense necessitated the installing of a hot water heating system being left over for another year. At the annual sale a large sum was realized. The untiring efforts of the physician of the home, Dr. Ross, and the matron and assistant matron, Mrs. Thompson and Miss Ferguson, are much appreciated.

The report of the treasurer, Mrs. G. A. McGowan, was very satisfactory considering the calls on the treasury during the year.

The election of officers resulted as follows: President, Mrs. W. H. Macnee; vice-presidents, Mrs. J. B. Walkem and Mrs. E. T. Steacy; secretary, Mrs. E. J. B. Pense; corresponding secretary, Mrs. B. P. Pellan; treasurer, Mrs. G. A. McGowan.

J. C. McConachie, agent of the Children's Aid Society, presented a proposal of the city council, through the finance committee, to erect and equip a wing to the Infants' Home for the shelter of children from twelve to fifteen, while Mr. McConachie is looking for suitable homes for them. This new department is greatly needed and the proposal appears quite feasible. The need of a government institution for the care of undesirable children, through physical defects, was pointed out. The proposition of the finance committee will be considered by the committee of the Home.

A vote of thanks was passed to those who had labored in the interests of the Home during the year, and the meeting was closed with prayers by Dean Bidwell.

A GOOD INVESTMENT.

Locomotive Works Bonds Will Yield 6 Per Cent.

The Canadian Locomotive Company, of Kingston, has recently secured a general manager, A. W. The product of the Canadian Locomotive plant at Kingston, is in good demand among Canadian railways, and orders on hand practically ensure two years' continuous work on the basis of the present output of seventy-five locomotives per year being materially increased in the near future. The first mortgage bonds, now being issued to provide for extensions to the present plant, seem to be a well secured industrial investment, giving a return of six per cent.

CHANGES WILL BE MADE ON QUEEN'S RUGBY TEAM.

Several Men to Pick From for Vacancies Created by Players Being Hurt—R.M.C. Will Not be Easy Proposition for 'Varsity II.

Queen's has three vacancies to fill for Saturday's rugby game in Toronto. McLeod, Kinella and Erskine, three of the huskiest and fastest men on the team, will be off the line-up against 'Varsity. It will not be hard to put men or to fill their places, but it is a question whether they will be able to replace them satisfactorily. Several men have been tried out on the line during the practices so far this season, and they will be worked out the remaining practices of this week. The places will be filled this afternoon in all probability, as this is the last workout the team will have before leaving for Toronto. The team leaves Friday at noon.

Harriers do not Go.
 Queen's Harrier team will not go to Toronto next Saturday as was announced and expected. Arrangements were made on the local end of it to have the team go up there this week, but the Toronto men could not connect, so the harrier meet has been postponed for another week.

Think R.M.C. Easy.
 According to the Toronto papers, 'Varsity II' thinks that the R.M.C. rugby team will be an easy proposition to cork for the intermediate intercollegiate championship. Knowing the way Queen's rugby team has played this season they have taken it for granted that when R.M.C. was beaten so badly by Queen's in the exhibition game here, Monday, the cadets will be easy marks in Toronto, Saturday. A word to the wise is sufficient. They seem to forget that Queen's played a faultless game against the soldiers and they have also forgotten that McGill proved easy victims in both R.M.C. games. Probably 'Varsity' has superior material in the second team to either that of McGill II or R.M.C. I.

Daniels May Be Back.
 It has been rumored that Daniels, the star goal-keeper of Queen's hockey team, who performed in the nets a couple of years ago, may be back again. When asked about it, to-day, Queen's authorities said they did not know of it, but if he did come back he would have to report before November 15th in order to be eligible to play.

Orilla Picked as Winner.
 Although it is far too early to be talking about hockey, fans who are much interested in this truly Canadian sport are prophesying already. It is predicted that Orilla will win the senior O.H.A. cup, which the Frontenacs have won two years in succession. Frontenacs were the only team in the flesh last year, and since they have removed to senior company, all are looking for Orilla's first team to land the cup. They will have the same team to a man this year as they had last.

S.S.A.A.A. Executive.
 The by-law passed at the last meeting of the executive of the S.S.A.A.A. regarding city league basketball players, playing in the Sunday school series, will be discussed at the meeting to be held this evening. A letter has been received by the secretary, asking that the matter be reconsidered, which will likely be done.

Sunday School Basketball.

The Sunday school teams are practicing so as to be ready for the basketball season when it opens. The Y. M.C.A. is arranging so that each team will have a practice once a week. A number of the teams are waiting the outcome of the meeting on Thursday evening. Some of the teams say that if anything is done with the decision which the executive made with regard to the city league players they will not enter. Having city league men playing certainly does not give the newer players a chance. In some cases the latter are only the laughing stock of the crowd present to see them get trimmed, as they did last winter.
