Severe fighting with rebel successes is reported from Pekin. Thirty-two liberal candidates are now in the field in Ontario. Milk in St. Thomas is 7c a quart, or twenty-nine pints for a dollar.

At Winnipeg four children were drowned by falling through ice. Halifax, N.S., gave a splendid ovation to Borden and his colleagues. The official losses by the big fire in London, Ont., Friday morning, total \$870,000; insurance \$335,000.

Officers of the Royal Grenadiers, Toronto, have paid off the mortgage on the home of Private Clifford, the king's prize man.

Lady Colin Campbell, the divorced wife of a brother of the Duke of Argyll, died in London, on Thursday, after a long illness.

Puffing a cigarette, and smiling at the attendant, Abraham Isaacs, aged one hundred and six years, died in a hospital at San Francisco, on Thursday.

North Bay police, citizens and blood hounds are scouring the woods for Arthur Hood, township constable, alleged to have criminally assaulted his twelve-year-old sister-in-law.

The steamer Huronic, of the Northern Navigation Company, running between Sarnia and Fort William, and formerly famous as the fastest boat on the lakes, is to be lengthened by fifty feet.

Mrs. John Quinn, of Chicago, was arrested, on Thursday, charged with the murder of her husband, who carried \$3,000 life insurance, she being the beneficiary.

Rear Admiral Potts, U.S.N., retired, is rumored the third and last of his daughters to religious life when Miss Francis Potts entered Carmelite convent at Baltimore, Md.

Clarence W. Gleiding, commercial traveller, of Winnipeg, was brought from Regina, charged with bigamy. He is accused of having a wife in Winnipeg, and two in New Jersey.

Chicago physicians think a severe attack of blood poisoning from which Miss Rose Gordon, a school teacher, is recovering, was caused by a drop of ink soaking in beneath her finger nail.

Ex-conductor Frank Baker, Stratford, has been officially appointed stationmaster at the London, Ont., U. T.R. station, to succeed Thomas Shortt, who went to Hamilton to fill the vacancy caused by the superannuation of John Carroll.

Miss Geraldine Daley, of Montreal, bought a diamond ring on the installment plan, and had paid \$100 on it, when she was taken ill and payments ceased. The jeweler from whom she bought the ring seized it. Miss Daley sued him and received her \$100 back.

DEATH OF MRS. McCLYMONT.

At the General Hospital on Thursday Evening.

These passed away, at the general hospital, at 9.30 o'clock, Thursday night, Mrs. Mina McLymont, of 168 Kent street, Ottawa. She died from anæmia, after an illness of about six weeks. In September, she left Ottawa to visit her son, Percy, and family, who were spending the summer at Tremont Park, and from there she came on to Kingston. Taken sick while here, she entered the general hospital. Dr. D. E. Mundell, and the officials and nurses there did all they could for her, but the end came, on Thursday night. She was unconscious at the time of death, and suffered no pain whatever.

Deceased was born in Manchester, England, sixty-one years ago, and came to Kingston with her husband, in 1881. Ten years later, the latter died, and was buried at Cataract, and it will be beside him that the wife's remains will be placed. She leaves three sons, Gilbert, of the Ottawa Journal staff, and with whom she has lived since leaving Kingston, eight years ago; Richard, manager of the Williams meat store, Sarnia, Ont., and Percy J., of the railway lands branch of the interior department, Ottawa. There are also relatives in Cyprus river, Manitoba, near Pierson, at Kinneer's Mills, and in several townships.

Deceased was a member of the Women's Temperance Union, the King's Daughters' guild and other benevolent and philanthropic organizations at Ottawa, and some years ago was connected with several such in Kingston.

The body was removed from the hospital to the undertaking parlors of H. J. Reid, 122 Princess street. The remains will be there until 9.30 o'clock, Saturday morning, when they will be taken to the First Baptist church, where the deceased attended when living here, and where the pastor, Rev. Douglas Loring, will conduct a short service. While the funeral will be of a private nature, friends or relations are invited to attend the church service.

Many beautiful floral tokens were placed on the casket, and relatives who are here to attend the funeral have received numerous messages of condolence from Ottawa, Toronto, Sarnia and elsewhere. They have the sympathy of many here, in their hour of bereavement.

The Kingston Health Association Congratulated.

Hamilton, Nov. 2.—(To the Editor): Will you kindly allow me a little space in your valuable paper to congratulate the Kingston Health Association and the citizens of the dear old Limestone City on their successful achievement in establishing a sanatorium for the care of tuberculosis patients. Being an old Kingston boy I am always interested in its welfare, and you have my warmest congratulations. I am a patient myself in the Hamilton sanatorium and my heart goes out in sympathy to my fellow sufferers in this disease. I hope every man, woman and child will interest themselves in the grand work you have undertaken, and help to stamp out the dreaded "white plague."

We have a splendid institution here and have had excellent results since its opening. A great many of the patients who have received treatment have gone back to their different occupations. Again, nearly all our help and some of the nurses have been ex-patients. We have a resident physician, and at present there are forty-eight patients in residence, fifteen of whom are children under thirteen years of age. These children are treated at the sanatorium, a beautiful building by itself, with nurses and an open-air school room.

I am fortunate enough to occupy a bed in the Empire cottage, donated and furnished by the daughters of the Empire, who have always taken a great interest in the work here.
